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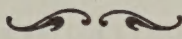

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Foreword

By a generous bequest in his will, the late James Duncan Phillips made it possible for the Essex Institute to publish original records relating to Essex County. His feeling, often expressed, was that publication could preserve a unique document from the hazards of time as well as make it more widely available to scholars. With ever increasing historical research, frequent handling is hard on old material. This publication is made possible by a grant from this fund.

The Records of the First Church in Salem constitute a major document in the history of Salem and the Bay Colony as well, and the value of this publication is increased by the fortunate chance that the transcription and editing were done by Dr. Richard D. Pierce who had performed the same task for the Colonial Society of Massachusetts in the publication of the *Records of the First Church in Boston*. Despite his untimely death in August, 1973, the essential work was completed with the benefit of his great scholarship in the field of New England church history.

The Essex Institute in particular and scholars generally owe a debt of gratitude to the members of the First Congregational Society in Salem for making available the valuable records of the Society for the purposes of this work. Last, but by no means least, our thanks are due to Professor Robert E. Moody, who, on the unexpected death of Dr. Pierce, organized his nearly completed work and provided a scholarly introduction which adds greatly to its value.

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Introduction

“Gather my Saints together unto me that have made a Covenant with me by sacrifice. psa: 50:5.”

The Massachusetts Bay Company

In 1623 a fishing company known as the Dorchester Adventurers was organized in Dorchester, England, under the auspices of a Puritan minister, the Rev. John White, and began its activities at Cape Ann in New England. The company was a commercial failure; its leader, Roger Conant, with White's encouragement, in 1626 moved to Naumkeag, a more favorable location, soon renamed Salem. In 1628 the Adventurers, reorganized as the New England Company on the basis of a land grant from the New England Council, sent over John Endecott with a band of English colonists as the beginning of a larger plantation. While Endecott and his settlers struggled against the hardships of a New England winter, the New England Company enlarged its support in England, procured a charter (March 4, 1629) from King Charles I, gathered, with the necessary supplies, a company of about two hundred men, women and children from English Puritan parishes, and hired a fleet of five ships. In late April and early May 1629 the prospective colonists embarked from London, landing late in June at Naumkeag harbor.

The purpose of the Massachusetts Bay Company under its royal charter was to plant a colony in New England which should be a refuge for English Puritans increasingly threatened in their religious practices by the efforts of the bishops of the Church of England to enforce uniformity in the Church. To secure substantial support, the Company was organized as a joint-stock company in which wealthy Puritan landowners and merchants were urged to invest both for profit and as a religious duty. Since religion had a primary place in this colonial enterprise, provision for the worship of God in accordance with Puritan beliefs was essential to the Company's plans. Accordingly, The First Church in Salem was instituted on August 6, 1629.

The Organization of the Salem Church

The only other church in New England at the time was at Plymouth. Organized in Leyden, Holland, as a Separatist congregation, this church had migrated as a unit, expecting that at an opportune time, their pastor, Rev. John Robinson, and the rest of the congregation would join them. At Salem the colonists had been members of different parish churches, none of them Separatist. The Massachusetts Bay Company left it to the colo-

nists themselves to organize their own Puritan church providing only the necessary spiritual leaders. Three clergymen, Rev. Francis Higginson, Rev. Samuel Skelton, and Rev. Francis Bright were carefully selected, after due inquiry into their suitability, for the tasks ahead. They were well known to at least some of the members of the Company, they had been silenced in England for their refusal to conform, and they were well recommended by other Puritan clergy. They had "declared themselves to us to bee of one judgment, and to bee fully agreed on the manner how to exercise their ministry,"¹ wrote the Company to Endecott. "For the manner of the exercising their ministrie, and teaching both our owne people and the Indians, wee leave that to themselves, hoping they will make God's word the rule of [their actions], and mutually agree in the discharge of their duties; and because their doctrine will hardly bee well esteemed whose persons are not revered, wee desire that, both by your owne example and by commanding all others to do the like, our ministers may receive due honour."²

While the new group of settlers and the ministers were on the seas, John Endecott in Salem had been discussing church policy with Samuel Fuller, deacon of the church at Plymouth, who in May 1629 had come there to give medical aid to those ill with scurvy. When Fuller returned to Plymouth, Endecott wrote to Governor Bradford concerning their conversations:

"I acknowledge myselfe much bound to you for your kind love and care in sending Mr. Fuller among us, and rejoyce much that I am by him satisfied touching your judgments of the outward forme of God's worshippe. It is, as farr as I can yet gather, no other than is warranted by the evidence of truth, and the same which I have professed and maintained ever since the Lord in mercie revealed himselfe unto me; being farr from the commone report that hath been spread of you touching that perticular."³

No matter how pleasing Governor Endecott found Deacon Fuller's explanations, the fact that Endecott says that what he has heard is the same which he had "proffessed" ever since he became a Puritan means either that he had long been a Separatist or that he is writing a gracious letter of acknowledgement of a rewarding visit. We have no evidence at all of Endecott's having had Separatist ideas while in England; it seems unlikely that Fuller had converted him in so short a time. In any case, the influence of the ministers, not yet arrived in Salem, must be considered before concluding that Fuller's persuasions determined the course of Salem's church.

Discussions by the English Puritans of reforms in the Church of Eng-

land had gone on for some time, chiefly concerning the evils and corruptions such as the use of the prayerbook, the formal ritual and the powers of the bishops, from which the reformers wished to escape. There were many ideas but little formal agreement as to the precise discipline they wished to substitute for existing practices. Even the Separatists were noted for their violent divisions. Higginson, Skelton and Bright, when they embarked for the new world, were familiar with the arguments over the position of the individual congregations within the Church. Congregational ideas were known to them, but they were not Separatists. Given the opportunity at Salem to organize a reformed church far from the bishop's restraining hands, the new arrivals adopted policies which their contemporary non-conformist critics, who decried the abandonment by the emigrants of the cause of reform in England, thought deserving of the condemnation especially directed at the Separatists. From the point of view of the Salem leaders, conditions forced them to adopt procedures in practice not in theory. As believers in uniformity, they paid tribute both to Mother England and to the Mother Church; as believers in their duty to provide a true church according to the Bible's teaching, they developed their own congregational policies, in which they could not avoid the tensions inherent in any system attempting to give liberty to true believers and at the same time an orderly way of religious life to the whole community. Henceforth the balance between the authority of the brethren, the ministers, the neighboring churches, and the state would be questions debated in every particular church.⁴

The early proceedings at Salem were described by Charles Gott, a deacon in the Salem church, in a letter, dated July 30, 1629, to Governor Bradford:

“The 20th of July, it pleased God to move the heart of our governour [John Endecott], to set it apart for a solemn day of humiliation for the choice of a pastor and teacher; the former part of the day being spent in praise and teaching; the latter part was spent about the election, which was after this manner; the persons thought on⁵ (who had been ministers in England) were demanded concerning their callings; they acknowledged there was a two-fold calling, the one an inward calling, when the Lord moved the heart of a man to take that calling upon him, and fitted him with gifts for the same; the second (the outward calling) was from the people, when a com-

pany of believers are joined together in covenant, to walk together in all the ways of God, every member (being men) are to have a free voice of their officers, &c. Now we being persuaded that these two were so qualified as the apostle speaks of to Timothy, where he saith a bishop must be blameless, sober, apt to teach, &c. I think I may say as the eunuch said unto Philip, what should let him from being baptised, seeing there was water, and he believed; so these two servants of God clearing all things by their answers (and being thus fitted) we saw no reason but that we might freely give our voices for their election after this trial: Their choice was after this manner, every fit member wrote, in a note, his name whom the Lord moved him to think was fit for a pastor, and so likewise, whom they would have for teacher; so the most voice was for Mr. Skelton to be pastor, and Mr. Higginson to be teacher; and so they accepting the choice, Mr. Higginson, with three or four more of the gravest members of the church, laid their hands on Mr. Skelton, using prayers therewith. This being done, then there was imposition of hands on Mr. Higginson: Then there was proceeding in election of elders and deacons, but they were only named and laying on of hands deferred, to see if it pleased God to send us more able men over; but since Thursday, (being, as I take it, the 5th⁶ of August) is appointed for another solemn day of humiliation, for the full choice of elders and deacons and ordaining them.”⁷

The account written by Nathaniel Morton about forty years later gives the clergy a considerably more important part in the formation of the Salem church. He says that Higginson and Skelton told Endecott and the rest of the Salem people of their intention of settling a “Reformed Congregation,” and, finding general concurrence, they proceeded to set a date for the election and ordination of their ministers. Higginson drew up a Confession of Faith and Covenant in “Scripture-language”, inserting one article into the Confession of Faith about the “Duty and Power of the Magistrates in Matters of Religion.” Thirty copies of the Confession of Faith and Covenant were written out for the thirty original church members.

“When the sixth of *August* came,” continued Morton, “it was kept as a day of Fasting and Prayer, in which after Sermons and Prayers of the two Ministers, in the end of the day, the foresaid *Confession of Faith and Covenant* being solemnly read, the forenamed persons did solemnly pro-

fess their Consent thereunto: and then proceeded to the Ordaining⁸ of Mr. *Skelton* Pastor, and Mr. *Higginson* Teacher of the Church there. Mr. *Bradford* the Governour of *Plimouth*, and some others with him, coming by sea, were hindred by cross winds that they could not be there at the beginning of the day, but they came into the Assembly afterward, and gave the *right hand of fellowship*, wishing all prosperity, and a blessed success unto such good beginnings. After which, at several times many others joyned to the Church in the same way. The *Confession of Faith* and *Covenant* forementioned, was acknowledged onely as a Direction pointing unto that Faith and Covenant contained in the holy Scripture, and therefore no man was confined unto that form of words, but onely to the Substance, End and Scope of the matter contained therein: And for the Circumstantial manner of joyning to the Church, it was ordered according to the wisdome and faithfulness of the Elders, together with the liberty and ability of any person. Hence it was, that some were admitted by expressing their Consent to that written *Confession of Faith* and *Covenant*; others did answer to questions about the Principles of Religion that were publickly propounded to them; some did present their Confessions in writing, which was read for them, and some that were able and willing did make their Confession in their own words and way.”⁹

Cotton Mather in his *Magnalia*¹⁰ follows Morton very closely but adds:

“They did all agree with their brethren of *Plymouth* in this point,
That the children of the faithful were Church-members, with their

Parents; and that their Baptism was a Seal of their being so; only before their admission to a Particular Church, it was judged Necessary, that being free from Scandal, they should be examined by the Elders of the Church, upon whose Approbation of their Fitness, they should Publickly and Personally own the Covenant; so they were to be received unto the Table of the Lord: And accordingly the oldest son of Mr. Higginson, being about Fifteen Years¹¹ of age, and laudably Answering all the Characters expected in a Communicant, was then so received."

Rev. William Hubbard, as well-informed regarding church matters as any contemporary, stated that unlike the Plymouth people who were already a church when they came to New England, the Salem colonists were "honest-minded men, studious of reformation that only disliked some things in the discipline of the Church of England, but were not precisely fixed upon any particular order or form of government, but like *rasa tabula*, fit to receive any impression that could be delineated out of the word of God, or vouched to be according to the pattern of the Mount, as they judge. Nor are their successors willing to own that they received their platform of church order from those of New Plymouth; although there is no small appearance that in whole or part they did, (further than some wise men wish they had done,) by what is expressed in Mr. Endicot's letter, above inserted; or else good wits, as they use to say, did strangely jump very near together, into one and the same method and idea of church discipline." Moreover, wrote Hubbard, if Higginson and Skelton had followed the advice of Mr. Hildersham, the famous opponent of the Separatists, and had agreed upon their form of church government before leaving England, it would "at least have saved some of the succeeding ministers from the imputation of departing from their first principles. . . . But they had not, as yet, waded so far into the controversy of church discipline as to be very positive in any of those points wherein the main hinge of controversy lay between them and others."¹²

The Increase in Churches

As the Massachusetts Bay Colony grew in population and churches multiplied, tensions between members and non-members of churches in their local communities, between members of churches in their relationship to their ministers, and between individual churches, which insisted on their local autonomy, and ministers in general, most of whom saw the advisability of calling councils of neighboring churches to obtain some degree of uniformity, brought about unpleasant disputes. Though many new parishes were the result of the settling of new towns, and caused little discussion, others were formed within old communities by the withdrawal of members from existing churches, often for reasons of convenience. At times the older churches opposed what might seem to be natural division because of fear of diminishing influence. Church councils consisting of neighboring churches came to be a device for settling disputes but individual ministers sometimes opposed their use.¹³ In the face of threatened chaos over church discipline, the General Court made provision for general meetings or synods of the clergy for the discussion and resolution of prevailing difficulties. One met in 1647 which resulted in the Cambridge Platform of 1648, another in 1663, and still another, "the reforming synod" in 1679. The General Court also called for the observance of Fast Days, Days of Thanksgiving, and Days of Humiliation in order to bring to people's attention their sinful lives and the need for reform. The long-expected blessings of God upon his chosen people seemed few indeed compared to the evidences of God's wrath in the form of Indian wars, earthquakes and other natural catastrophes, as well as the multitude of tragedies of everyday life in the new world. The clear evidences of sin were all around. The clergy must be stirred to new vigilance and the Days of Humiliation were opportune occasions for the solemn renewal of church covenants.

Rev. John Higginson, installed in Salem in 1660, followed closely, if indeed he did not lead the trend to observe "renewals of the covenant" in an effort to impress the people with their need for reformation. After the Synod of 1662, he drew up "Directions" for his church in Salem, insisting however that they should be considered only as guides, while hoping that they would be universally adopted by his church. The first page of the printed document explains its content and intent:

A DIRECTION for A PUBLICK PROFFSSION In the CHURCH ASSEMBLY, after private Examination by the ELDERS.

Which Direction is taken out of the Scripture, and Points unto that Faith and Covenant contained in the Scripture.

Being the same for Substance which was propounded to, and agreed upon by the Church of *Salem* at their beginning, in the sixth of the sixth Moneth, 1629.

In the Preface to the Declaration of the Faith owned and professed by the Congregational Churches in England.

The Genuine use of a Confession of Faith is, that under the same Form of Words they express the substance of the same common Salvation or unity of their Faith. Accordingly it is to be looked upon as a fit meanes, whereby to express that their Common Faith and Salvation, and not to be made use of as an imposition upon any.¹⁴

Again, after the Synod of 1680 and a second renewal of the covenant in Salem, another pamphlet was printed, also written by Rev. John Higginson:

A Copy of the Church-Covenants which have been used in the Church of Salem Both formerly, and in their late Renewing of their Covenant on the day of the publick Fast, April 15, 1680.

*As a Direction pointing to that Covenant of Gods Grace in Christ made with his Church and People in the holy Scripture.*¹⁵

This tract begins "There was a Church Covenant agreed upon and consented to by the Church of Salem at their first beginning in the Year, 1629, Aug. 6. The following Covenant was propounded by the Pastor, agreed upon and consented to by the brethren of the Church, in the year, 1636." Then follows, exactly as it appears in the present first volume of records, the preamble of 1636, the covenant, and finally the renewal of 1660, when Rev. John Higginson became pastor. On pages 5 to 8 is an entirely new covenant "to be used as a direction for the Renewing of our Church Covenant, as being more accommodated to the present times, and state of things amongst us."¹⁶

Mr. Higginson's high regard for the synods, his recognition of ecclesiastical councils, and his refusal to allow "errors" aroused opposition within

his parish. After having approved the employment of Rev. Charles Nicholet in 1672 as his assistant for a probationary year, he found him erroneous in some particular ways. The town, however, without asking the opinion of either church or pastor, approved Nicholet for an additional year and, at its conclusion, voted to give him lifetime tenure. Up to this time Higginson, desiring peace, had not openly protested. At a church meeting however he voiced his particular objections¹⁷ to Nicholet, and the latter seemingly admitted errors and agreed to reform. His adherents, desiring to give him full support, went to Lynn and at a hastily assembled gathering of ministers from Boston, Woburn, Malden and Lynn with Gov. John Leverett obtained approval for a new church. Before the conclusion of the council's deliberations, representatives from Beverly, Wenham, and Salem appeared. Their views threw a different light on the situation and the vote approving the formation of a new church was rescinded. When the dissidents, chiefly townspeople but including a few members of the church, appealed to the General Court,¹⁸ Higginson answered in an "Apologie."¹⁹ The General Court met at Salem; its Committee²⁰ recommended conciliation and a church council. The council was never held, probably because Nicholet's supporters realized that a decision by churches would be unfavorable to them. After preaching "nine farewell sermons", Nicholet returned to England, the Salem church under Higginson giving him its recommendation. The movement for separation ended, though not the controversy between the authority of the town and the authority of the church.

Other movements for separation were upon the obvious grounds that more convenient facilities for worship would be provided closer to the homes of the communicants. In 1667, the "brethren and sisters on Basse River side" petitioned to be dismissed from the Salem church to be a church by themselves. Dismissal was voted by the First Church on July 4, 1667, and on September 9, Rev. John Hale was ordained.²⁰ Shortly after, the inhabitants of Bass River petitioned for power to choose selectmen (May 27, 1668) and the town of Beverly was incorporated on November 7, 1668.²¹

Up to 1684, Marblehead had no church of its own. On June 6, 1684, the Salem Church voted to dismiss the brethren and sisters of Marblehead "that they (and their children) might become a Church of themselves."²²

Less amicable was the dismissal of members of the Salem church to form the Middle Precinct (Peabody) Church, which was considerably delayed because of the failure of the withdrawing members to consult in advance. The vote to dismiss was taken on June 25, 1713.²³

The East Church of Salem had its origin in a dispute over Rev. George Curwen who was elected minister of the Salem Church by the church but not by the parish.²⁴ The church considered calling a council to resolve the difficulty but the parish, seeing their probable defeat, acquiesced in the choice on May 8, 1711.²⁵ Subsequently "many of the inhabitants living without the Town bridge" obtained from the General Court the setting up of a separate parish. On the strength of this, the people there proceeded to build a meeting house, and finally asked, as they should have done before, dismissal from the First Church. The petition was reluctantly granted for "Peace sake" on December 25, 1718.²⁶

Rev. Samuel Fisk and the First Centennial

The death of both ministers of the First Church, Nicholas Noyes and George Curwen, in the same year, 1717, the immediate cause of the withdrawal of members to form the East Church, also opened the way to the calling of Samuel Fisk, grandson of John Fisk who had preached briefly in Salem, 1637-1640. Relieved of its withdrawn dissenters, the Church seemed on its way to a peaceful existence under the new minister. Mr. Fisk had a historical bent and in November 1728 informed a church meeting that he proposed to preach a centennial sermon the following August. No one objecting, he did so, thus observing, for the first time in American history, the hundredth anniversary of a historical event, Plymouth having neglected its opportunity in 1720. The sermon on August 6, 1729 was said to have been excellent, though it was not printed, and no one had the foresight to preserve a copy. Of the event, the *New-England Weekly Journal* recorded: "She was the 1ST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH that was completely form'd and Organiz'd in the whole AMERICAN CONTINENT. . . . The CENTURY LECTURE Began with Singing Psal. CXXII. The Rev. Mr. *Barnard* of *Marblehead* then Prayed. We then Sang Psal. CVII. 1-8. The Rev. Mr. *Fisk* then Preach'd a very agreeable Sermon, from Psal. LXXVIII. 1-7. which is earnestly desir'd and hop'd to be Printed. We then Sang Psal. XLIV. 1, 2, 6, 7. The Rev. Mr. *Prescot* then

Prayed. We then sang Psal. C. 1st Meter, and the Rev. Mr. *Fisk* Pronounc'd the Blessing. There were *Thirteen* Ministers Present, and a considerable confluence of People both from this place and the Towns about."²⁷ In the election sermon which Mr. Fisk preached two years later he reminded the General Court that Massachusetts was "entering on the second Century of chusing our own Magistrates."

Since Mr. Fisk's innovative observance of 1729, more than two centuries have passed. In 1829, Rev. Charles Wentworth Upham delivered a second century address;²⁸ in his attempt to be scrupulously accurate in the date of the observance, he made a mistake in translating old style to new style and preached on August 17 instead of August 16. A hundred years later, in 1929, the committee scheduled the ceremonies for the period May 26 to June 3.²⁹

The Dismissal of Rev. Samuel Fisk

In spite of the harmonious appearance of the Centennial observance of 1729, all was not well in the Salem Church. Mr. Fisk was inclined to be authoritarian and to act independently of formal church meetings which it was said had been dispensed with for ten years altogether. He had but one deacon and failed to discipline some members who had been absent from communion, specifically William Gidney, with whom he had harsh and threatening words, Mr. Bickford and Nathaniel West. Resentments such as these were brought to the surface in February 1725/26 when Mr. Fisk announced that he would discontinue the lectures which he had been giving on his own account for several years. The situation was rather involved. When Mr. Fisk became minister in 1718, he discontinued the formal lectures as they had been given under his predecessors, saying that he would increase his visiting. For some reason he began giving the lectures on an informal basis, only to decide that they were too sparsely attended. In May 1726 the Parish committee asked Fisk to set up the lectures again. He replied that he did not know what the parish had to do with the lecture. Yet in March 1728, the minister preached a sermon in which he said that a vote of the church to set up a lecture was a vow to God and that not to have performed a vote to that effect taken in December 1718 was "Sac-rilege and Perjury." This rebuke aroused much resentment in some of his congregation, among whom were Judge Benjamin Lynde of the Superior Court of the Province and his son. In their discussions of the minister's

remarks, the "aggrieved brethren," as they were called, could only recollect that it was cold on the night of the December meeting, and late, and that it was agreed that the matter of the lectures should be brought up at a subsequent meeting on December 25. Inspection of the record showed that this was essentially correct; the record referring matters to the later meeting read "Also what may properly be done towards the carrying on of a lecture every other week in this Place."³⁰ When subsequently the record of the December 25th meeting was demanded, Mr. Fisk produced an entry which read as follows: "Voted that the Brethren of the Church will privately speedily consider of Some proper Method to Revive a Lecture in this place, and when they are prepared a Number of them shall repair to the Pastor and pray him to Call a Church Meeting farther to prosecute the vote passed in the last church Meeting, concerning the Lecture."³¹ This puzzling vote astonished the aggrieved brethren and when in due time it too was examined, witnesses stated that the item was written "in different ink, and a great Pen, and interlined," and "in a very different ink from the other votes, and seemed to be by another Pen, and crowded between two other votes." Inspection today of the record gives one the definite impression that the item of December 25 was written in later. Because of lack of space for the entry, it appears somewhat crowded, but no more so than other entries which also had been apparently written in after the other entries. If Mr. Fisk followed the practice of other scribes, it is quite possible that he wrote the various votes of church meetings on slips of paper and copied them later in making up the formal record. He himself implied that this was what he had done. It was this interpolation — called forgery — of a vote, which the aggrieved brethren could not recall, to which they objected, especially since it was on the basis of this "vote" that they had been denounced. To settle the matter, they insisted that a church meeting be called. Fisk refused to meet the brethren or to call a church meeting, or to attend a council of churches in a series of interchanges marked by a good deal of hair-splitting, and on the part of the minister, wounded dignity. Finally the aggrieved brethren, through the intervention of Boston ministers, obtained a meeting of a council of nineteen churches at Salem in 1735 which Fisk did not attend, refusing to acknowledge its authority when one of the parties, himself, had not requested its intervention. The result was a conclusion that there was a strong presumption of the interpolation of a vote never taken, that Fisk's charge of "Perjury and Sacrilege" was therefore "a very aggravated offense," and finally that Fisk had been guilty of neglect of discipline and unworthy treatment of the church in not calling a church meeting when requested, especially in the case of Bickford. The "aggrieved brethren" thereupon called their own church meeting and dismissed Fisk.³⁰ The threat of excommunication de-

creased the number of Fisk's adherents, the minister was physically kept from entering the meeting house in an unseemly brawl between contending parties and, when a new meeting house was erected for him not far from the old one, the General Court intervened to order the building removed some distance away.³¹ The dismissed minister and his excommunicated supporters organized a new church which they called the First Church in Salem, and installed Fisk as minister on April 23, 1736.³² On the basis of this claim, Mr. Fisk kept the volume of church records, as has been stated elsewhere in this volume.

One result of the dismissal of Mr. Fisk — the confusion over the title of First Church in Salem — was resolved in 1755, when the members of the First Church, reinforced by those who had returned because of their opposition to Dudley Leavitt, now claiming a majority of the membership that had existed before 1735, voted to "take on them in all public transactions the title of the First Church of Salem." In 1762, the Leavitt church voted to surrender its claim to the title of First Church in exchange for a portion of the church plate and lands, and henceforth to be known as "The Third Church of Salem." Later Salem's South Church, which separated from the "Third Church" in 1775, challenged this title. Meanwhile the "Third Church" became known as the "Tabernacle Church."³³

The Record Book

The original book of records of the First Church in Salem has been lost for many years — at least before 1755 when Rev. Thomas Barnard noted that the volume was missing, and probably much earlier. This lost book was sequestered in 1660 by the vote of the Church. Under the date of September 10 of that year, the newly-installed pastor, Rev. John Higginson, recorded: "After a sufficient time spent by the forenamed brethren [Major Hawthorn, Mr. Batter, Mr. Price, two deacons, and the pastor] in reviewing the Church booke, they gave this account unto the Church, that they conceived the booke itselpe and paper of it being old not well-bound and in some places having been wett and torne, and not legible and not like to continue long to be of use for Posterity therefore they thought

that it best that it were kept in safety by the Elders by that means it may be of good use so long as it will last. Only some few passages in it which doe reflect upon particular persons or upon the wholl Church without any Church vote and without due proof, they did mark in the book as thinking these should be struck out."³⁴ A month's time was given wherein the passages mentioned might be seen by church members. The book was referred to on November 6, 1662 in the following words: "Concerning the Baptizing of Elder children such as Pasca Footes in other Church Book Nov. 28. 1652."³⁵ Again, in 1675, Rev. John Higginson referred to the old record when he told the General Court that Rev. Edward Norris was accused of having had Presbyterian ideas in the last days of his ministry."³⁶ But nothing more is now known of this book.

At that time, 1660, a new book was provided. Into it were copied such earlier records as had been directed by the church vote. They begin with the Church covenant of 1629, but before it was placed the preamble which prefaced the renewal of the covenant in 1636 when Rev. Hugh Peter became minister. Then followed a catalog of the members admitted until near the end of 1636, then a list of admitted members to 1659, and also a list of children baptized from 1636 to 1659. The contemporary record of church meetings, church members and baptisms therefore begins in 1660. Of earlier church affairs including some of the type blotted out by vote of the church in 1660, a glimpse may be had from the entries in the note-book of Rev. John Fisk, assistant, 1637-1640.³⁷ It seems extraordinary that in this substitution of a new for the old book, there is no mention of ministers previous to John Higginson, save only Edward Norris.³⁸ Considering that two of them were Roger Williams and Hugh Peter, this seems all the more remarkable.

After 1660, the records continue according to what seems to be a new plan, until 1735 when Rev. Samuel Fisk was dismissed. He kept the book in his own possession and, until and including 1743, he entered the various Feast and Thanksgiving days kept in Salem. His record of baptisms ends with 1743 and therefore includes the baptisms performed by Rev. Mr. Fisk as pastor of the church organized by his supporters who withdrew from the old church.³⁹

The Return of the Record Book to the First Church

When Samuel Fisk died in 1770, the record book passed into the possession of his son, John Fiske,⁴⁰ the Revolutionary general, with the father's admonition not to give up the book while he lived. When the General died in 1797, the volume was in the possession of Rev. William Bentley, pastor of the East Church, whose interest in old books and manuscripts was well known in Salem. It was said by some that General Fiske had expressed the wish that after his death the book be returned to the First Church. Dr. Bentley made no move to comply, explaining in his diary⁴¹ on October 12, 1806, "As the Old Church Book has been required, tho' a deposit from Gen. Fiske, a vindication of the detention is to be formed from the history. It is itself a computation from an older book destroyed by vote. It is the Book against which the charge was brought of false entry. It was lent by the Pastor to the church to be copied at discretion. That copy has been transferred to another church⁴² by the Son⁴³ of the transcriber.⁴⁴ This book was held during the controversy which was the first Church & for entries in a Church⁴⁵ different from that which claims to be the first church, and as many a division took place, as many old families remained in the second church⁴⁶ as in any portion of what was the first church."

Both Rev. John Prince and a committee from the First Church applied to Bentley without success. Finally in May 1811, Dr. Bentley returned the volume to Ebenezer Putnam, General Fiske's son-in-law, who gave it into the custody of the First Church where it has since remained. Dr. Bentley's part in the transaction is best told in his own words. "Elder Beckford & John Pickering from the first Church waited upon me for the first Church Book, which Mr. Fiske gave in charge never to return, & to save from destruction I received from his Son General Fiske in trust. Mr. Putnam appeared in behalf of the heirs & declared that at his death the Gen[eral] wished the Book to be given to the Church. The cause of the detention was from an action of fraud in the Book. My Elder Ward knew the whole matter as he received the Book to bring it to Pastor Fiske after it had been copied for the use of the old Church & as heard the Gen.'s

Charges to me which he never recalled.⁴⁷ As this matter moved just at the time of our public elections to make trouble, without advice I sent the Book to Mr. Putnam thus directed on the paper in which it was wrapped. 'To Ebenezer Putnam Esqr. one of the heirs of General Fiske at his request.' I afterwards told Elder Ward what I had done & he in all circumstances approved it."⁴⁸

Editorial Procedures

In preparing these records for the printer, all names have been transcribed exactly, except that all abbreviations, where the name is known, have been expanded; otherwise they have been kept, allowing the reader to determine for himself whether, for example, "Jon:" is "John" or "Jonathan." All abbreviations of words except the names of months have been expanded. "And" has replaced the ampersand (&). For convenience of reference, dates have been uniformly placed on the left side of the page or column. Where months have been given as numbers, they have been kept; the reader should remember that March is the first month of the year in the calendar of the period. But even though the new year did not begin until March 25, the scribe did not always wait until that date to indicate another year.

The works given abbreviated titles in the notes may readily be identified in the Short Title List in the appendix. Further data regarding the clergy who were graduates of Harvard College may be found in the series known as *Sibley's Harvard Graduates* in which all of the biographies except those of the first three volumes were written by Clifford K. Shipton. It has been thought unnecessary to encumber the footnotes with references to these volumes whenever a minister graduate's name appears.

On May 25, 1811, the Church voted: "The Book being very much out of binding, and in an unsafe state," that the pastor be "requested to have it bound in a strong manner, in order to preserve it, and that a copy of this ancient record be made for the Church."⁴⁹ A new book was purchased, bound in Russia leather costing \$10. and the old records copied in. The old book, newly bound in Russia leather at a cost of \$5., interleaved with blank paper, with the new book and other papers was placed in a specially made box costing \$3.25. The transcription of the records cost \$25, the repairs twenty-five cents.

Wee whose names are here under written, members of the present Church of Christ in Salem, haveing found by sad experience how dangerous it is to sitt loose to the Covenant wee make with our God: and how apt wee are to wander into by pathes, even to the looseing of our first aimes in entring into Church fellowship: Doe therefore, solemnly in the presence of the Eternall God both for our owne comforts and those which shall or maye be joyned unto us renewe that Church covenant we find this Church bound unto at their first begining. vizt: That we Covenant with the Lord and one with an other, and doe bynd our selves in the presence of God, to walke together in all his waies, according as he is pleased to reveale him selfe unto us in his Blessed word of truth. And doe more explicitly in the name and feare of God, profess and protest to walke as followeth through the power and grace of our Lord Jesus.¹

1. first wee avowe the Lord to be our God, and our selves his people in the truth and simplicitie of our Spirits
2. Wee give our selves to the Lord Jesus Christ, and the word of his grace, fore the teaching, ruleing and sanctifyeing of us in matters of worship, and conversation resolveing to cleave to him alone for life and glorie; and oppose all contrarie wayes, cannons and constitutions of men in his worship.
3. Wee promise to walk with our brethren and sisters in the Congregation with all watchfullness, and

tendernis avoyding all jelousies, suspitions, backbyte-ings, conjurings, provoakings, secrete riseings of spirit against them, but in all offences to follow the rule of the Lord Jesus, and to beare and forbear, give and forgive as he hath taught us.

4. In publick or private, we will willingly doe nothing to the ofence of the Church but will be willing to take advise for ourselves and ours as ocasion shall be presented.
5. Wee will not in the Congregation be forward eyther to show our owne gifts or parts in speaking or scrupuling [2] or there discover the fayling of our brethren or sisters butt attend an orderly cale there unto; knowing how much the Lord may be dishonoured, and his Gospell in the profession of it, sleighted by our distempers, and weaknesses in publyck.
6. Wee bynd ourselves to studdy the advancment of the Gospell in all truth and peace, both in regard of those that are within, or without, noe waye sleighting our sister Churches, but usinge their Counsell as need shalbe; nor laying a stumbling block, before any, noe not the Indians, whose good we desire to promote, and soe to converse, as wee may avoyd the verrye appearance of evill,
7. Wee hearby promise to carrye ourselves in all lawfull obedience, to those that are over us in Church or Common weale, knowing how well pleasing it wilbe to the Lord, that they should have encouragement in their places, by our not greiveing theyre spirites through our iregularities.
8. Wee resolve to prove our selves to the Lord in our particular calings, shunning ydlenes as the bane of any state, nor will wee deale hardly, or opressingly with Any, wherein wee are the Lords stewards: alsoe
9. promyseing to our best abilitie to teach our children and servants, the knowledge of God and his will, that they may serve him alsoe and all this, not by any strength of our owne, but by the Lord Christ, whose

bloud we desire may sprinkle this our Covenant made in his name.

This Covenant was renewed by the church on a sollemne day of Humiliation 6 of 1 month 1660. When also considering the hower of Temptation among us by reason of the Quakers doctrine to the leavening of some in the place where we are, *and Endangering of others*,¹ doe see cause to remember the Admonition of our Saviour Christ to his disciples Math 16. Take heed and beware of, the Leaven of the doctrine of the Pharisees and doe judge so farre as we understand it that the Quaker doctrine is as bad or worse than that of the Pharisees. Therefore we doe covenant by the help of Jesus Christ to take heed and beware of the leaven of the doctrine of the Quakers.²

[75] John Higginson formerly a member of this Church being removed from Gilford [*Connecticut*] and come to the Bay in order to his going for England, was by importunity prevailed with to stay here for one year, desired by 2 generall votes of the Church and towne to continue with them in the work of the Ministry. After his continuance here almost a year he gave his answer to the call of the Church and people here in these words,

"It hath been matter of serious enquiry to me what
 "should be the will of God and my duty in this
 "great turne of my life, especially in ordering my
 "Abode here amongst you for a time which hath
 "been overruled by the Providence of God wholly
 "beyond my owne intention in my removall from
 "the place where I was before. And yet truly when
 "I have considered all, I encline to look at the call
 "of the people here as the call of God for my con-
 "tinuance amongst you. I desire to be thankful to
 "God and thankfull to you all for your Love to
 "me and mine, and am willing to settle amongst
 "you as in Acts. 2.42 so when I joyn in church
 "fellowship with you

1 "So long as the church and people of God here continue in the stedfastnes of Faith in Christ and order of the gospel as now you doe, and

2 "So long as I finde that I can (with a good Conscience)

1. carry on the part of the worke of Christ which may belong

2. to me and discharge my duty to my Family.

"I doe express my selfe willing to settle amongst
 "you with a true intention, and a true affection
 "having no other thoughts or desires but to live and
 "dye amongst you as my Father did before.

"There is but one thing, I would commend unto
 "the Congregation that you would seriously think

"of a Ruling Elder, for though I should not be un-
 "willing to doe what the Lord shall enable me,
 "yet I am not free to undertake Church work
 "without the Assistance of a Ruling Elder, the
 "place being great, the people many, and the work
 "like to be much especially in such times as these.
 "And for myselfe I know my own weaknes many
 "wayes and that I shall have need of the Freedom
 "of my spirit and command of my time, that I may
 "in some measure fulfill the work of the Ministry
 "unto which I am called of God by your selves.

A motion being made for choosing a Ruling Elder:
 Mr. John Brown being nominated, after some con-
 sideration he was (in his absence) chosen by the
 Church with generall consent: On the 8th of the 5th
 moneth the call of the Church was signified unto
 himselfe being then present; he expressed his accept-
 ance of the Churches call the Lords Day after, to
 this effect

"that though he judged himselfe unfitt, and many
 "others more able for the work, yet considering
 "the call of God and his people in it, and that he
 "might be any means of the Churches settlement,
 "he did give up himselfe to the Lord and to the
 "Church in the work so farre as the Lord should
 "enable him thereunto, only his occasions at Vir-
 "ginia did require his presance there the following
 "winter and when the Lord should pleas to return
 "him safely from thence he should then continue
 "at home and apply himselfe to the work as the
 "Lord enable him.¹

¹Elder John Browne was a mariner and merchant trading
 in Maryland and Virginia. His name first appears in
 the Salem records on July 12, 1637; was shipwrecked in
 in 1660; died at Salem in 1685. He should not be con-
 fused with John Browne, gentleman, who came to Salem,
 highly commended by the Massachusetts Bay Company as
 "a man experienced in the laws of our Kingdom," but
 who was forced to return to England through the opposi-
 tion of Governor Endicott. Felt made this error but the
 autographs reproduced by Perley leave no doubt that they
 were two different persons. Cf. Perley I, 107, 166, 429.

[76] On [blank] of [blank] moneth. Letters of Recommendation and dismission from the Church of Gilford concerning J. Higginson and his wife, were read unto the Church, and they were both received members of this Church after the usuall manner. After which the Church did signify by a vote with generall consent their Election of him to the office of Pastor in this Church and he did manifest his acceptance of their call thereunto promising to attend the work of that office amongst us as the Lord should help him.

It was thought meet in regard that many of the brethren would be shortly absent upon the necessary occasions of their callings at sea, to hasten the ordinance of the Pastor and Elder, which was accordingly agreed upon to be on the [blank]¹ of the 6 month; and letters were sent unto 4 of the neighbor churches of Ipswich Linne Reading and Boston, to give them notice of the churches intention about the ordination at that time, desiring the presence of their Elders and Messengers then.

The day above said J. Higginson was ordained Pastor with prayers and Fasting and imposition of hands, preaching out of I Corinthians 3.7. He that plants is nothing and he that watereth is nothing but God that gives the encreas.

The Church having no Elders then, our honoured brother Major Hawthorne and 2 Deacons imposed hands on the Pastor and then the Pastor and the 2 Deacons imposed hands on the Ruling Elder, the Elders of the foresaid churches being present (with many others) Mr. Norton Teacher of the Church of Boston did in the name of the rest give the right hand of fellowship to both our Elders showing from Galatians 2.9 that the right hand of fellowship was a signe of the communion and helpfullnes which both churches and Elders were engaged in one toward another as the case might require.

A Church meeting
Sept. 10

At a meeting of the Church September 10
It was agreed upon and voted by the Church.

1. Concerning catechizing: that Mr. Cottons Catechisme be used in their Families in teaching of their children in order to publike catechizing in the congregation:
2. Concerning the Lords Supper:
 1. For the time of the Administration of it to be in ordinary course once a month.
 2. For the charge of it, the Lords Supper being proper to the Church, it was thought meet not to take in the help of non members contribution for it; therefore it was agreed upon: That every member of the Church (except the poor) doe bring in to the Deacons halfe a crown in merchantable pay, it being left unto their discretion to provide the bread and wine, and when the summe raised by the halfe crownes is spent, then the Deacons to propound unto the Church for another contribution in the same way for the same end.
 3. That on dayes of Humiliation and Thanksgiving the Deacons propound for a contribution for the poor of the Church.
 4. That Major Hawthorn Mr Batter Mr Price and 2 Deacons together with the Pastor be desired to review the Church booke and to report such things to the Church as they conceive worthy of consideration.

Review of the former
Church booke

After a sufficient time spent by the forenamed brethren in reviewing the Church booke, they gave this account unto the Church. that they conceived the booke itselpe and paper of it being old not well-bound and in some places having been wett and torne, and not legible and not like to continue long to be of use for Posterity therefore they thought it best that it were kept in safety by the Elders by that means it may be of good use so long as it will last. Only some few passages in it which doe reflect upon particular

persons or upon the wholl Church without any Church vote and without due prooffe, they did mark in the booke as thinking these should be struck out.

1. Also that in the New book; that in all matters tending to censure, nothing to be brought to the Church, nor left upon record, without sufficient proof.
2. That all Church Acts (or Votes) be so recorded as to be read unto the Church, if it may be at the time when the vote is passed; if not to be read the first thing at the next Church meeting.
3. That any brother have liberty to see the Church book for his satisfaction.

Any brother to have liberty

[77] These things were consented unto by the Church, onely some of the brethren propounded which was readily consented to, that there might be liberty to such as desired it to see those passages mentioned in the former book for a moneths time

It was also then agreed to have a publike Day of Humiliation.

1. To humble ouselves under the afflicting hand of God in the generall sickly time this winter, and in letting loose Seducers to prevaile so farre with so many in this place.
2. To seek the Lord for his presence with us in carrying on Church work and for his mercy in reducing those that goe astray.
3. To renew our covenant and to adde the clause of taking heed of the leven of the doctrine of the Quakers.
4. To seek the Lord for the peace and welfare of ourselves, and of our native land. Accordingly on the first week of the first moneth the Church and people here assembled in a day of Fasting and prayer and the Pastor spake something from Rev. 3.10 concerning the hower of Temptation, and also concerning our duty of Commandment keeping from Psalm 50.5. In the close of the day the

Church covenant was renewed and the clause added, that By the help of Christ we would endeavour to take heed and beware of the leaven of the doctrine of the Quakers according to the command of our Saviour Christ in Mathew 16.

1661 It pleased God to returne home our Elder Mr. Brown in safety from Virginia in the 3rd month notwithstanding the casting away of his vessel and goods to his great losse, and a great danger he was in afterwards by the Indians which preservation and deliverance was related by himselfe and for which sollemn thanks was rendered to the Lord in the congregation.

Elders attending every 2nd Day

Soon after the Elders gave publike notice that they should be present at the Pastors house every 2nd day of the week at one o clock and so spend the afternoon (and more if there should be need) with any who should come to them in a preparative way in order to the Churches knowledge and consent.

These following Propositions concerning the state of the children of members were agreed upon and voted by the church according to Scripture:

1. That the children of the members borne in the Church or received with their Parents in their minoritie are true and reall members by virtue of divine Institution, according to that in Genesis 17.7. I will establish my covenant with thee and thy seed after thee to be a God unto thee and thy seed. The name of the children are put into the covenant by the Lord as well as the Parents name. Acts 3.25: such children are expressly called the children of the covenant which God made with Abraham.
2. The membership of such children doth not cease but by virtue of some other divine Institution, viz that of Excommunication. Matthew 18., I Corinthians 5 they are brethren therefore not to be accounted as Heathens, Publicans or wicked persons but by a just and orderly Excommunication. Hence it followes.

1. Such children have a right of claime to all the ordinances as they are capable of enjoying them in an orderly way, because they are children of the covenant Acts 3.25, and brethren Matthew 18
2. They have a right unto baptisme in their Infancie that being now the first Seal of the Covenant, and these being children of the Covenant Acts 3.25 and our Saviour witnessing for them that such children belong to the Kingdome of Heaven. Matthew 19.14.
3. They are under the watch and care of the Elders who are to take heed unto all the flock over which the holy ghost hath made them overseers, but such children belong to the flock, they must take care of the Church of God. I Timothy 3.5.
4. They are under the watch and care of the wholl Church, and in case of just offences they may and ought to be proceeded with either privately or publicly in an orderly way according to Matthew 18 and Luke 17.3. If thy brother offend thee, these are brethren.
5. That it is the Parents duty by diligent Instruction of their children to prepare them for and bring them to the triall of their fitnes for full communion. Deuteronomy 6.7. Thou shalt teach these words diligently unto thy children. Genesis 18.19 Abraham will command his children to keep the way of the Lord. Joshua 24.15 I and my howse will serve the Lord.

[78] 6. When they are at years of discretion and desire to joyn in full communion it belongs to the Church to judge of their fitnes for full communion in an orderly way. I Corinthians 5:12 Do not ye judg those within. (1) It belongs to the Elders Duty to examine them of their knowledge with Application to themselves; that it may be knowne they are able to examine themselves judge themselves and discern the Lords body, according to I Corinthians 11. (2) The Elders making known to the Church their desires for full communion the parties are in a Church meeting to expresse their own desire, their owning their Parents

This last was added another time—but afterwards this last was otherwise agreed upon and consented unto, first the case of Bartholomew Gidny and after that in all others of the children of the Covenant vide 1665 at this mark pag 84¹

covenant, and their knowledge with Application to themselves, if they can; or, the Elders to read for them what they have received from them.

And if there be no just exception against them in a moneths time they are to be received unto full communion to enjoy and use their right in the Lords Supper, and in votes as other members doe Acts 10. 47. Can any man forbid, etc.

At a meeting of the Church about October last

Richard Harvy, and Mary Lay having stood propounded for a moneths time, and no exception against them, they were received unto membership by consent of the brethren; they making their confession and testimony given of their conversation.

The Elders propounding the case of divers members removed from us divers years. It was consented unto that the Elders should write unto them to desire them that as the Lord gives them opportunitie they would either returne to us or els joyn unto some other Church which was accordingly done.

And whereas divers members of the Church as Joseph Boys John Kichin Joseph Pope and his wife, Mrs. Gardiner and John Maston, were generally known to absent themselves from the ordinances of Christ amongst us some of them appearing and giving no just reason for their withdrawing to avoid teediousnes our brethren Major Hauthorne Mr. Bartholmew and brother Prince were desired to bestow as much time in private discourse with them as they should think meet; that if it be possible they might gaine them, and to report what successe they find the next Church meeting.

A motion being made by some Elders in the Bay unto this Church to joyn with them in a day of Humiliation to seek the Lord for his mercy and favour in removing the judgment of sicknes, and for preventing our fears, and continuing the blessings of Church and Commonwealth which was consented unto and kept on December 22.

Mr. Blackleach and his wife being removed to live at Hartford desired their dismissal unto that Church, which was consented unto by the Church here and sent unto them by the Elders.

The Generall Court of this Colonie being exercised this wintertime with many difficulties, taking into consideration the many sinnes that might provoke the Lord against his people, in particular unprofitableness under the means, decay of first love, neglect of the order of the Gospell, inclination in the young generation to Prophanes etc. and the many dangers we are lyable to in these times from complaints against us, intrusion of Heretics, the Combination of Anti-Christ against all the Servants of God.

The Court did commend unto all the Churches and Inhabitants of this jurisdiction, and appoint the 2nd day of the 11th moneth to be kept as a day of Humiliation and Supplication to the Lord for a thorough returning from our provoking evils, and for the diverting of such calamities as may be coming upon us and the people of God elsewhere.

Which day was accordingly kept at the time appointed.

The Elders and our brothers Bartholmew and Price were desired to consider of the cases of any of the children of the Church who have given offence before their membership was acknowledged by the

The case of the 6 members who had foresaken the Church Assemblies was again considered, and they not being gained by all the forementioned dealings of the Church with them, nor so much as coming to the Elders for conference as was desired, nor making their appearance before the Church as they were warned to doe; they having so long a time forsaken the fellowship of the Church, and in so doing cast out themselves and cast of[f] the Church, in the issue of the consideration by a vote of the Church it was consented to that these 3, J Maston, John Kichin and Joseph Boys should have the sentence of Excommunication pronounced against them and by another vote of the Church that the other 3, J. Pope and his wife and Mrs. Gardiner should be admonished, and further time given to them. Accordingly on the Sabbath following the Pastor preaching on Hebrews 10:25 Not forsaking the Assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is; shewed from thence the greatnes of the evill of those brethren and sisters in a constant war and course of breaking

the 2nd and 4th commandments, and that their way was a casting out the Church and casting out themselves. Boys and the sentence of admonition upon J. Pope and his wife and Mrs. Gardiner which later was sent unto them in writing by 2 of the brethren.

On 26 of 12th moneth being the Sabbath day was read an order from the General Court, for calling of a Synod, this Church (as the rest of the Churches in the Colony) being desired to send their Messengers of Elders and brethren to Boston on the 10th of the 1 moneth, there to discusse and declare what they shall judge to be the minde of God revealed in his word concerning these 2 Questions. 1. who are the subjects of Baptisme 2 Whither according to the word of God there ought to be a Consociation of Churches and what should be the manner of it. It was left unto consideration till the Lords Day following when Major Hawthorne Mr. Bartholmew and the Pastor were chosen to go to the Synod at the time appointed; which accordingly they did; the Synod continuing together almost a fortnight, finding questions to be weighty and that divers of them could not then stay longer together they adjourned the Synod to the 10th of the 4th moneth next, this the messengers of this church gave notice of on the next Sabbath after their returne home.

About 2 moneths after the sentence of Admonition was sent unto Mrs. Gardiner, Joseph Pope and his wife they sent in their answer in writing denying to continue their fellowship with the Church in the ordinances of God charging the Church with bloodie cruelty etc. which writings of theirs being read unto the Church, they did vote the sentence of Excommunication which accordingly was pronounced by the Pastor.

The Synod meeting again on the 10th of June was adjourned again till the 10th of September of which notice was given to the Church.

Our Brother Raymont and his wife removing their dwellings to Seabrook desired letters of recommendation to the Churches in those parts which was granted by the Church.

A day of Thanksgiving October 19 The Church was acquainted with 2 orders from the Generall Court the one recommending to the Churches a day of thanksgiving on November 5 with referens to the safe returne of the messengers giving such a portion of the fruits of the earth after threatning to deprive us of all, and the continuance of the mercy of the Gospel to us hitherto, the other recommending also a day of Humiliation on December 5 in consideration of the afflicted and low estate of the cause and people of God universally in these times together with some publike rebukes of God amongst ourselves: which 2 dayes were accordingly kept at the times agreed upon.¹

Letters were sent from the Church at Gloster, giving notice of their intention to ordaine Mr. Emerson¹ as their Pastor and desiring this Church to send their Messengers to be present at the ordination. The Pastor and Captain Lothrop and W. Allen were desired by this Church to goe thither at the time appointed which they did, and at their return an account was given to the Church by the Pastor and the ordination was approved of by the messengers of the Churches then present.

desiring this Church to send their messengers to be present with them on the day appointed and accordingly the pastor and brother Porter were desired by the Church here, to goe thither then which they did and after their returne an account was given to the Church by the Pastor that for the substance their proceedings at Topsfield in the churchgathering and ordination there was approved of by the messengers of the churches there present.

Also our brother Browning living at Topsfield and desiring his dismissal that he might joyn in church fellowship there it was granted by the church here.

Nov. 20

A day of thanksgiving was propounded and consented to by the Church with relation to the mercies of the year, and the Lords continuance of our peac and liberty thus long in such times as we live in, which was accordingly kept, at the time appointed.

Dec. 12

It was propounded to the consideration of the Church whether God did not call us unto more frequency in Publike days of Humiliation and seeking to the Lord for mercy with respect unto that great affliction and reproach which is come upon so many thousands of Ministers and Christians in these times by means of Episcopall usurpation, and human impositions in the worship of God, also with respect unto dangers threatning ourselves. It was chearfully consented unto that once a moneth for the 4 following moneths to set apart a day for seeking the face of God in sollemn Humiliation and prayer which was accordingly done on the last of which 4 days viz. the 16th of the first moneth the Church Covenant was read and sollemnly renewed by this Church.

by the messengers of the Churches, also Mr. Got and his wife and his sonne Charles and Mark Bachilor at their desire were dismissed then from hence to joyne with the Church there.

Freeborn Sallo's the daughter of brother Wolfe having made her confession and renewing her Covenant ther being no exception against her she was admitted to partake of the Lords Supper.

Christopher Babbidge, Mrs. Woodcocke, Margery Williams the wife of Isack Williams and Jone Pitman the wife of Thomas Pitman of Marblehead having been propounded the usuall time, there being no exception against them, and sufficient testimonie for their conversation they were on the Lords Day following admitted unto membership by the vote of the Church.

4 moneth 5 day
Elder Brown dismission from his office

Elder Brown upon his return from Virginia this spring finding by experience his occasions such as he could not attend the office of an Elder with the constancy and expence of time that the work of it did require, and professing a need of attending his calling as a seaman, when he was to be much absent from the Church, he desired of the Church that they would dismis him from his office that he might with more freedome of Spirit attend the necessary duties of his calling. The Church after some time of consideration consented to his desire, and accordingly on the 5th day of the 4th moneth he was dismissed from his office.

W. Dountons Recommendation

A letter of recommendation was read unto the Church from a Church at Weymouth wherein William Dounton and his wife and Edward Humber were recommended unto the Communion of this Church, which was accepted and they admitted to Communion with us by virtue of the Communion of Churches.

A Fast

An order from the Generall Court was read, wherein in regard of the many distractions and troubles of this

colony and the afflicted state of the people of God in other places was recommended to all the Churches of this colony, the 15th day of the 4th moneth as a day of Humiliation and prayer which was accordingly observed on the day appointed.

4 moneth-19 day

A letter of dismission was desired by Johanna Town and Margaret Reddington to the Church at Topsfield, which was accordingly granted by the church here and sent unto them.

5 moneth-17 day

The Pastor acquainted the Church with an accusation and prooffe against Samuel Archer Senior, for Drunkennes, taken out of the records of the County Court before which he was convented and censured viz. Isack Williams affirmed that the last winter before one of the dayes of Humiliation Samuel Archer came to his howse and was distempered with drink as he conceived Mr Batter affirmed the same, that his carriage was such as he conceived him distempered with drink.

Christopher Walker affirmed that one day before a day of Humiliation the last winter in the evening he met Samuel Archer in the street by Mr. Browns he saw him fall down, and being near him went unto him, and spoke to him, and he answered him not but said Hugh, and he rising up went towards Goodman Princes rayles and there stumbled and fell down again, and after he was got up again he observed he went in a staggering way. The following Testimonies were taken upon oath before the honoured Magistrate Major Hawthorn at Marblehead on 6th of 5 moneth Rachel Codner Mary Brown and Sara Pike affirmed that upon a 2nd day of the week this summer they saw Samuel Archer of Salem lead an Indian woman by the hand along the way, and that he reeled very much []¹ they conceived him to be very much in drink. Luke Morgan and Georg Knight both of Marblehead affirmed that at the time above expressed they saw Samuel Archer put from him the

Indian woman, and that he took up with his hand the lap of his skinne or coat and threw it aside.

This accusation and proof being read on the Lords Day, a meeting was then agreed on for further hearing of the case, which was on the 27th day of 5th moneth, the Church being met: when after the reading of the formal accusation and proof again, Samuel Archer presented a writing desiring it might be read, wherein amongst other things he did confess that he had sinned against God, dishonoured his profession and grieved the Spirit of his brethren by his often drinking more than was meet etc.

Admonition

The Pastor then showed his sinne by application of Gods word unto him and his scandalous sinne from the Ephesians 15.28 which speaks of excessive drinking, and Corinthians 6.10.5 that drunkards are excluded from the kingdom of heaven; and he was remembered that he had formerly been admonished¹ many years ago for the sinne of drunkennes and that his falling into it now again was an aggravation of his former evill, divers other things were also spoken to him by divers of the brethren to help forward his Conviction and Repentence, and so it was left for the present.

Impenitence

3 weeks after he was warned by the Pastor to come before the Church on the Lords Day viz 21 day of 6 moneth, when he was called but came not, making his excuse that he was not well. The Sabbath following being the 28th day he was called againe, and then appeared: when he was farre from manifesting any repentance in his expressions he did seem to comfort himself that he had confessed his sin and God had pardoned him also recriminating others Brother Rixe, Major Hauthorn, and Mr. Batter did then witnes that since he had been now dealt with in the Church assembly for his drunkennes he had fallen again into the same sinne in some degree. The issue was there being none to witnes for him, and no signe of repentance appearing in him, but rather signes of

one besotted and hardened in his way, the Pastor propounded, and it was by the vote of the brethren generally consented unto, that he should be excommunicated out of the Church.

The sentence of Excommunication was accordingly pronounced on the Sabbath following viz. Sept 4 pronounced by the Pastor from the 1 Corinthians 6.10 shewing that impenitent drunkards are excluded from the Kingdome of Heaven, which was applied unto him and that text was afterwards for divers Sabbaths emproved for a warning to others.

Fast

There was another Fast recommended from the Generall Court in regard of the Lords frown, taking away much of the fruits of the earth and sending other signes of Gods displeasure against us which was accordingly observed on the day propounded viz. 1 of 7 moneth

Another Fast was also kept on the 16 of November upon the same grounds for the same ends with the former.

Mrs. Banks

On the 6th of 9th moneth the Church was acquainted with the desire of Mrs. Lydia Banks who had been absent from the Church 22 years that she might be dismissed to a Church in London of which Mr. Nye¹ is Pastor which was consented to by the Church.

Dismission

Also the desire of our Honoured Governor and his wife was made known to the Church for their dismissal to the Church at Boston which was accordingly consented to by the Church and sent unto them.²

Synods propositions
read

About the same time was a meeting of the Church for the reading of the propositions of the Synod touch-

ing Baptisme and consociation of churches at the end of which the Pastor promised that in time convenient he would communicate unto the brethren a short writing as a help for the [*practice of the Synod's propositions:*]¹

Fast

The Generall Court sitting at Boston, finding many difficulties in the transaction of affayres with his Majesties commissioners, did send abroad a writing wherin they desired all the churches as people of God to be sensible of the many provoking sinnes, that were amongst us and also the many signes of Gods displeasure against us, and that all would apply themselves to Humiliation and Reformation and to cry mightily unto God []² that he would be reconciled to us and that in particular he would graciously encline his Majesties heart to favour us, accordingly they recommended the 22th day of the 4th moneth to be kept as a generall day of Humiliation and prayer which was observed amongst us at the time appointed as in other places.

Children of the
Covenant

On the 18th day of the 5th moneth being the Sacrament Day, the pastor preached on Acts. 3.25 you are the Children of the Covenant which God made with your Fathers. whence he delivered this Doctrine that "Children born of Parents in Covenant, they are Children of the Covenant and continue so to be, untill they be discovenanted in a way of God.

At the end of the sermon, he acquainted the church with the desire of 4 of the children of the covenant born and baptized in their church having now children born unto them desired that their children might be baptized. the parties themselves viz.

4 of them claiming
their rights

John Massy, John Gidny, Bartholmew Gidney, and Samuel Williams did stand forth and profess their

willingnes to own the covenant of the God of their Fathers, and did modestly claim the right of their children upto baptisme and desired they might be baptized.

Pastors Speech

The Pastor professed his willingnes and readiness to baptize these or any other children of the covenant amongst us according to his office it being clear to him to be his duty if he might doe it with the consent of the church in a peaceable way and he apprehended it as one of the great sinnes of the country that so many of the children of the Covenant were unbaptized, and that he would not that the sinne should lye any longer at his dore, being ready to do his duty — in that respect.

He also did bring to Remembrance, that the matter had been in debate at times in this church this 13 years.

That in the year 52 it was propounded by the former Teacher Mr. Norris as a Question to be agitated, concerning the baptizing of members children, and their children upon the right which was in severall church meetings debated in his time; when it was agreed that the children of Confœderates were reall members. and if he had not had grounds to believe that it was the Churches judgment that they were reall members, he had not ventured upon taking office in this Church. And after he was in office, it was brought into consideration again in severall church meetings when these 2 things were agreed upon and voted by the Church.

1. that the children of members born in the church or received in are true and reall members by divine institution
2. that their membership doth not ceas but by some other divine institution viz. excommunication.

After which there was a Synod, the result whereof was published and had been read in the church the scope of which was to show the Scripture grounds of the Doctrine that had now been delivered and that

the children of such are to be baptized. The Pastor also acquainted the church with the streight he was in, many of the children of the Covenant claiming baptism for their children which he knew not how to deny, and yet with a respect unto some brethren that were otherwise minded he had forborn as long as he could; but truly he did not see how he should be able to hold it long except he might have liberty to act in a peaceable way in this matter of baptizing the children of the covenant according to his owne judgment according to the Scriptures Luke 12 42. and though it was to be desired that we might all be of one judgment in this matter, yet it was not to be expected, but must be left unto God and time, we forbearing one another in love, as Eph.4.2. After some agitation the issue was. It was put to a vote. viz. whether . . . (M. H.¹ propounding and desiring it might be voted being but 2 appearing to offer dissent).² Whether the brethren of the church did consent that the Pastor should act in the Baptizing of the children of the covenant in this church in a peaceable way which was consented unto by the vote of the church at that time.

Accordingly the Sabbath following viz. the 30th day of the 5th moneth the aforesaid John Massy, John Gidny, Bartholmew Gidny, and Samuel Williams having been privately examined by the Pastor did publikely profess their taking hold of the covenant, after which their children were baptized, the names of which are recorded in the catalogue of the children baptized in this church.

On the 20th day of the 6th moneth Elizabeth Stone the daughter of brother Dixy after private examination by the Pastor, did publikely profess her taking hold of the Covenant, wherupon her 4 children were baptized the names of which are also recorded in the catalogue of the children baptized in this church.

Curwithy recommend Mr Curwithy and his daughter Curtis, and our brother and sister Harvy removing to Southhold desired letters of recommendation to the Church there which was granted by the Church, and accordingly sent with them.

3 of the children of the covenant born and baptized in this church having fallen into scandalous sinnes, and having been censured by the court; viz. Joseph Williams guilty of theft; Rebecca Bly and R. S. guilty of Fornication. They being called did appear and present themselves before the Church confessing their sinne, and professing their willingness to submit themselves to the ordinance of Christ. The matter of Fact being notorious needed no further proof, therefore after some of the brethren had spoken, the Pastor propounded that they might by layd under a publike and sollemn Admonition and so give them a space of Repentance which was consented to by vote of the Brethren of the Church.

Accordingly the Pastor propounded the 2 Corinthians 12 last, where it is said that many in the Church of Corinth had sinned and had not repented of the Fornication which they had committed: and then he made a personall application of the word unto these 3 delinquents charging the guilt of their sinnes upon them, shewing the danger of them and the wrath of God against then and yet his mercy promised if they did repent, each therefore was in the name of Jesus Christ required of them that they should apply themselves to repent of their sinnes before God, and due time to manifest their repentance before the Church for the removing of the scandall from our holy profession.

Also notice was given unto all other Children of the Covenant amongst us that they must expect to be under the watch and discipline of the Church as well as to partake of the priviledged of the Church, and both in a regular way. *and that for time to come the brethren should bring forth such as are scandalous.*¹

A Direction for a publick profession after private examination

The Pastor did then also acquaint the Church with the writing he had formerly mentioned¹ and read unto them as a help to reduce the doctrine of the Synod into practice, it being a Direction for a publick profession after private examination by the Elders which Direction is taken out of the Scripture and points to the Faith and Covenant contained in the Scripture. it being the same for substance propounded to and agreed upon by the Church of Salem in their first beginning. 1629 6th of the 6th moneth; it being now printed any that desired it should have one of them for their use.²

B. Gidny admitted to the Lords Supper

Bartholmew Gidny propounded his desire of partaking of the Lords Supper: saying he had submitted unto Examination of the Pastor and publickly professed his Faith and owning of the Covenant, he saw not that anything more was required of him from Scripture this being considered of and spoken to by the Pastors and severall brethren, it was in that issue consented unto with respect to himselfe though with respect unto others it was left unto further consideration.

Such as had renewed their Baptismal In-
gagements claimed the right to the Lords Table and by the Pastor were admitted without inquiring anything further of them³

Also Mrs. Sherman the daughter of Mr. Johnson (our brother) living in Boston but belonging to this Church. Being here she submitted to the Examination of the Pastor and publickly professed her assent to the doctrine of Faith, and her consent to the Covenant and her subjection to discipline and so had her child baptized and staying here to the Lords Day after, she having been with the Pastor the day before, who examining of her declared unto the Church that he did observe her as able to examine herselfe and discern the Lords body and so she was admitted to partake of the Lords Supper.

Day of Thanksgiving

The Generall Court is considering the mercies of the last summer in giving seasonable raine when there was fears of a drought, and diverting a squadron of Dutch ships that threatened to invade our coasts, to-

gether with our peace and liberty yet continued they appointed the 8th day of November to be kept as a sollemn day of thanksgiving, also considering divers causes of Humiliation amongst ourselves, and the sad condition of the people of God in other parts especially the severe hand of God in the Pestilence raging in London etc did appoint November 22 to be kept as a sollemn day of Humiliation, both which dayes were observed at the times appointed.

Also at the same time Mrs. Hanna Brown, Love Stevens, John Massy and John Ingersall were presented to the Church; as children of the Covenant such as had been either born in the Church or received with their Parents in their minoritie; and such having been formerly at severall times owned as members of the Church. The Pastor expressed that after his examination of them he did approve of them, as able to examine themselves and discern the Lords body, they being not under any Church censure he knew not of any Church-barre according to the Scriptures that might hinder them from partaking of the Lords Supper several of the Bethren did speak for it; only 2 of the Brethren which were absent the former church meeting when the same thing had been considered consented to and practised in the case of Bartholmew Gidny; they peaceably expressed their dissent, and that they would not oppose. The weather being cold and having been long together the Pastor propounded to them the substance of the doctrine of Faith and Covenant which God had made with their Fathers and the covenant duties they were engaged in in the church: which they all pro-

fessed their consent unto and so thus had their liberty to partake of the Lords Supper.

The council of this jurisdiction held at Boston on the 15th of the first moneth appointed the 5th day of the 2nd moneth to be kept as a day of sollemn Humiliation and prayer in consideration of the provoking sinnes amongst us and the tokens of Gods displeasure against us also considering the sinnes calamities and sufferings of the people of God in other parts, and expecting that many of Gods great workes, and gracious promises are not farre off from accomplishment as the conversion of Gods ancient people and the destruction of Antichrist.

This day was accordingly observed at the time appointed.

[87] On the 27th of the 3rd moneth: being the Lords day a writing was read subscribed by 6 hands wherin some brethren living at the Farmes, did acquaint the rest of the Church and people living at the towne that by reason of their distance from the meeting house they found many inconveniencies that they and their Families could not so comfortable attend the church assembly for the worship of God on the Lords day as they desired and therfore made a Motion to the rest that either they would help them to a Minister or leave them to their liberty to procure one themselves. This proposition was left unto consideration.

After some speeches of some of the brethren, they expressing their assent and consent to the confession of Faith and covenant read unto them, they had their liberty to partake of the Lords supper as other children of the Covenant formerly.

A message to the 4 un-
der church censure

After some consideration of the 4 children of the Covenant under Church censure the Pastor and brother Horne were desired to doe a message to and from the Church, that it was expected they should in convenient time come and appear before the church to manifest their repentance.

considered

Ther was some consideration of the Farmers motion for another minister but another writing being at this time propounded by 5 of the near neighbors and brethren there abouts desiring that they might not be Engaged in that designe. it did not appear they had a competent number also (by such of the brethren as spake) it was thought not at present to be seasonable to prosecute such a matter. Also that the agitation of some things that did concern it was more proper to a town meeting.¹

On the 9th of 12 moneth by the Lords day John Archer born and baptized in this church having been convented before the magistrate a fortnight before and fined for excessive drinking and breaking the peace, being called forth by the Pastor he appeared confessed his sinne and professed his submission to the discipline of Christ in his church. he was by the vote of the Church layd under the censure of Admonition, the pastor from Ephesians 5.18 be not drunk with wine wherin is excesse and Titus 1.6 children accused of riot and unrulines. he shewed this was the case and charged the guilt of these sinnes upon him, and required him in the name of Christ to repent of them before God and in due time to manifest his repentance in the Church.

The Pastor, and Deacon Horn acquainted the rest of the Church that they had given warning to the 4 children of the Covenant under Church Censure, that the Church expected their comeing to this church meeting to manifest their repentance for the removing of their great and hainous scandalls.

Accordingly Joseph Williams and John Archer were first called, but (1) neither of them appeared nor (2) did they send any excuse for their not comeing nor (3) did any appear to witnes anything for them as signes of Repentance (4) the Pastor and Deacon

Horne witnessed that in their speaking and dealing with them, they could not observe any signes of Repentance but rather the contrary, as besotted and hardned in their sinnes, it was generally judged by the brethren that spake and silently consented to by the rest, that they having had so long a space of Repentance granted to them and not hearing the Church they were to be cutt from their membership in this church as heathens and publicans, and the sentence to be pronounced by the Pastor on the Sabbath following; which accordingly was done with respect unto John Archer. *Onely Joseph Williams appearing on the Lords Day and desiring that further time and space might be given to him, it was consented to and he was respited unto further time.*¹

At the same time the Pastor gave notice of the desire of divers of the members of the Church to have their Elder as well as their younger children baptized: he did also bring to remembrance which was recorded concerning this case in the other Church book namely in the case of the 8 children of Pasca Foot Nov. 28, 1652 that it was agreed upon that the Elder children should resort to the Elders and to give some account of their Faith and that no more should be done in that matter. After which on the 6 of the 12 moneth the aforesaid 8 children were all baptized by Mr. Norris the Teacher of this Church.

The present Pastor expressed himselfe to concurr with the judgment of the Church and their former Teacher in this matter. and further said that he looked upon those 2 grounds to be taken together with respect to the children of members grown up.

1. that they were the seed of confederates according to Genesis 17.7.

2. that they were sonnes and daughters that had knowledge and understanding according to Neh. 10. Accordingly he desired that such as had children unbaptized that were grown or growing up to years of discretion, that they would first bring them to him

to be examined: and if upon due enquiry he found them neither ignorant nor scandalous, but such as according to their capacity did understandingly desire baptisme he was ready then to baptize their Elder as well as their younger children, divers of the Brethren did also speak for the encouragement of the Pastor in baptizing of such children in such a way.

At the same time Remember Salmon was called and appeared: confessing her sinnes and shame before the Lord and his people, desiring that her soul might be washed from her sinnes by the blood of Christ and that the people of God would pray for her and that she might be reconciled to the Church.

The Pastor did expresse that at severall times he had received from her more enlarged pœnitentiall confessions of her sinnes also Deacon Horn and some others did express their observations and comfortable persuasion of some hopeful signes of Repentance in her wherupon the Pastor propounding the words of our Saviour that if any did repent we should forgive them, divers of the brethren manifested their concurrence the rest silently consenting, he did pronounce the sentence of Absolution with respect unto her.

Day of Thanksgiving

On 8th November there was observed a publike day of Thanksgiving according to the Courts order: with respect unto the mercies of the year and continuance of our peace in a such a troublesome time

a Fast

On the 22th of November there was also observed a day of Humiliation and prayer (according to the Courts order) to humble our selves under the many signes of Gods displeasure against us and to make supplication for his mercy and the continuance of our blessings as hitherto.

Motion of the brethren
on Basse River

This winter was a motion made by the brethren on Basse river to the rest of the Church here at the towne, that they might have their consent to be a Church of themselves and to have Mr. Hale for their Pastor which was left unto consideration, and the last of the 12 moneth by the consent of the

brethren both on that side of River and here at the towne was publicly observed as a day of sollemn Fasting and prayer to seek unto God for his direction and presence in such a weighty matter.

A Fast

Also in the 2d Moneth another publick day of Humiliation and prayer was observed by order from the Court of Magistrates, as a means of our further Humiliation under the signe of gods displeasure against the English Nation and in particular the burning of London together with some lesser judgments of God amongst ourselves as the small poxe in the Bay and the many dangers we are exposed onto, and to seek the Lord's Mercy for the English Nation and unto ourselves here in this wildernes.

The Pastor acquainted the Church with 2 cases, the one wherin it was desired by the Sister Hollinwood that her daughter Starres Children might be baptized their mother though dead, yet being in minoritie when she was received into the Church and their being good testimonie of her hopefull godlines, the Q. was why might not her children be baptized ac-

ording to the 6 proposition¹ of the Synod which was read and left unto consideration.

Mary Hodges concerning whom there were many that could testify her eminent godlines, and was in that way to joyn to the Church herselfe yet dying before her joyning the Church she did on her death bed give her little child to Sister Roots who with her husbands consent took it for her own child; and did sollemnly owne it before the Church desiring if it might be according to rule, that the child might be baptized. The Pastor propounded and read several passages out of Mr. Cottons Way of the Churches, Mr. Shepards Church membership of children and the answer to the 21st Qu: tending to favour the baptisme of Adopted Children, both being new cases and not within the compass of the consent which the Pastor had by the Churches vote, for the baptizing of the children of the Covenant in this Church in the year 65, he did therefore propound and leave these cases to consideration against some other time.

The Pastor having formerly propounded and given Reasons for the use of the Bay psalm bookes in regard of the difficulty of the tunes, and that we could not sing them so well as formerly and that there was a singularity in using Ainsworths tunes, but especially because we had not the liberty of singing all the scripture psalmes according to 3 Colossians 16 he did now againe propound the same and after severall brethren had spoken there was at last a unanimous consent with respect to the last reason mentioned that the Bay psalm book should be made use of together with Ainsworths to supply the [].²

This writing being read together with the names subscribed, ther was a unanimous consent of the brethren present, unto their desire, onely it was left to the Sacrament Day after when in the fullest church assembly the consent of the rest of the Church was signified by their vote in lifting up their hands. and so they have their liberty to be a Church of themselves, onely they continue members here untill their being a Church, the Lord grant his gracious presence with them.

On the 9th of September these brethren of the Church gave us notice that they intended (if the Lord please) to joyn in Church fellowship together on the 20th day of the same moneth. desiring the presence of the Church here either by ourselves or Messengers. In regard of our nearnes and that they are a Church issuing out of ourselves, it was thought meet for as many to be present as could. So when the day came divers of the Brethren were present as also the Messengers of the Churches of Ipswich and Wenham. Mr. Hale propounded and read a confession of Faith and Covenant which they had often considered of amongst themselves, and did then (all that had been in full communion in the Church of Salem) expresse their consent unto that Confession and Covenant and so were owned as a particular and distinct Church of themselves, by the messengers of the Churches present and the brethren of that Church desiring of it, the Pastor of this Church was helpfull to them in the transaction of the business of the Ordination of Mr. Hale¹ as Pastor of the Church.

On the 25th day of the 1 moneth at the time of the Sacrament of the Lords Supper was read letters of dismission from the Church of Boston, in the behalfe of Joseph Phipeny and Dorcas his wife, they having lived some considerable time here they were accepted by the vote of the Church unto membership in this Church, and then so they entred into covenant with this Church.

Fast

Ther was an order read from the Governor and Counsell for the observation of a publicke sollemn day of Humiliation and prayer on the 26th day of March with relation to the great concernments of the Churches and people of God here, and also in our native land and other parts of the world, which was accordingly observed.

Jo. Hathorne examined by the Pastor, at his earnest desire was admitted to the Lords Supper on a Sacrament day, upon his solemn owning the covenant of God before the Church

On the 29th day Mr. Hales motion concerning the dismission of some other of the children of that Church that had not been formerly mentioned was considered: and the answer returned was viz. that it was intended to dismisse all the children at once and together with their parents that had been members here. so that there needed not a particular dismission of any of them.¹

The Generall Court in the 8th moneth having not appointed any publicke dayes of Thanksgiving or Fast and prayer as formerly, it was propounded by the Pastor for us to keep a publick Day of Humiliation and prayer particularly with respect unto the reasons in common with others, as with respect unto the afflicted state of the Church of God abroad, the many difficulties in carrying on the work of God in Church and Court, and the death of so many ministers amongst us of late; particularly with respect unto some reasons more proper to our selves as the

late breakings out of sinne and prophannes amongst us and the sad appearance of divisions amongst us that we might seek to God that he would heal our spirits, and give us peace. This motion was in the issue agreed unto by the brethren of the Church, and the day was kept by us on the 23 of December.

Also with respect unto the mercies of the year past, and the constancy of Gods goodnes to us here with continuance of our peace, and the newes of peace in England and the liberty is granted to the people of God in England in such a measure it was considered and agreed on to keep a day of Thanksgiving afterward, which was accordingly done on the 14th day of the 11th moneth.¹

In the beginning of the first moneth on the Sabbath an order from the Governor and Council was read wherin they recommended to all the Churches in this colony, to keep the 25 day of the moneth in publick Fasting and prayer in the sense of the many provoking evils amongst us, and the many tokens of Gods displeasure against us and the uncomfortable breaches in sundry places, and the present low estate of the Churches abroad stirring us up to seek to the Lord for mercy in these regards which day was accordingly observed here at the time appointed.

On the 3rd of the 2nd moneth was read a letter from the dissenting brethren of Boston sent unto this Church wherin they expressed that the result and advise of the Council called by the Elder and brethren the last summer was to grant them an amicable dismission in order to the propagation of another Church, this advise they had attended having several times moved for a dismission but in vaine. Therefore they made this addresse to sundry other Churches as their onely next refuge left them by Christ in his word; professing their firmnes to the government according to the Patent that they are not for any other way of Church order then that sollemnly declared from the Scriptures in the Platforme of Discipline; at the last Synod about the subject of Bap-

tisme and Consociation of Churches, desiring ever to maintain brotherly love and communion with the Church they desired to be dismissed from as also with the rest of the Churches. They did humbly again and again desire us in the bowels of Jesus Christ request and desire us, not to receive all sinister reports against them, but to send the Elder and messengers of our Church to meet with others in Council at Boston, upon the 13th of April to consider consult and give their helpful advise in their labouring case.¹ After the reading of this letter it was desired to deferre the issue till the Lords day after till it might be known from the Elders of Boston Church whether the Church there consented to such a Council or would give them a meeting; which by the Pastor (and others) was enquired of the week following who brought a negative answer from the Elders. Yet the Brethren of the Church generally did agree in this that ther was and ought to be a relief and remedy against miscariages in particular Churches in the Congregationall way. And in the issue by a vote they desired the Pastor and Captain Price to be present at the Council to goe not as members of the Council to vote therin, but to do what good they could as they heard Mr. Whiting² and Mr. Laiton³ of Lin Church were desired so to goe.

At a Church Meeting April. 30, 1669

Councill at Boston

The Pastor made some report of what was done at the Council wherin there was a meeting of mes-

sengers from 13 other Churches besides Salem and Linne, and that they applied themselves first unto the Elders twice and then to the Elders and brethren of the Church of Boston the third time in way of Mediation for a pacification, but were 3 times denyed to admit of any conference with them, so the Council considered of the advise of the first Council and the Scripture grounds of it, and saw cause to approve of it, viz. that the dissenting brethren might have their dismissal and in case the Church refused denying their dismissal they might take their liberty seasonably to be a Church of themselves as if they had had a formal dismissal.

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Children of the
Covenant admitted
here Lords Supper

Mrs. Putman, (Lieftenant Putmans Wife) Mrs. Abigail Ward, and Sarah Pickworth were presented before the Church. The Pastor expressed himself that after Examination he approved them as able to Examine themselves and discern the Lords Body. They sollemnly owning and renewing their Covenant, it was declared they had their Liberty to partake of the Lords Supper.

Non Members
admitted.

William Bartoll Mary Bartoll and Martha Beal of Marblehead, also Abigail Clark having stood propounded a moneth made their Confession, and in the issue there being no just exception against them, and some testimony for them, they were on the Lords day following admitted to membership of this Church by expressing their consent unto the Covenant, and by the Churches vote. G. Beal and H. Gilbert were not admitted.

It was then considered that Joseph Williams and Goodie Bly having been grossly scandlous the one for theft the other for fornication, and censured in the Court, and being children of the Covenant here, they had been publicly admonished and space of Repentance given and now this 2 year as yet they had not come, the Church agreed to send Mr. John Brown Senior and Henry Skery Senior to them to warn them to appear before the Church on the Sabbath Senight May the 9th.

Joseph Williams
restored

At which time Joseph Williams appeared and made a confession of his sinne, judging himself for it, desiring mercy and forgiveness from God and from his people. Tho his confession was more dry and more generall than was to be desired, yet Brother Brown and Brother Skery speaking something further on his behalfe what he had said to them, also the Pastor expressed that he had at severall times received sundry pœnitentiall expressions from him, as did also old Brother Browning, and there being nothing by any spoken to witness against him, which might contradict his confession. The Church in the issue enclined to accept of a low degree of a pœnitentiall confession and so by the lifting up of hands of many and silence of the rest he was by the Pastor declared to be released from his Censure and restored to the same estate he was in before, viz. as a child of the Covenant in an unblamable state.

Bly not appearing was left unto the next Church meeting.

Letter from the
Elders of the Church
at Boston

On the 16 day, being the Sabbath day was read in the publike assembly, a letter sent from 3 Elders of the First Church at Boston, to the Church of Salem, expressing their desires of a charitable Construction of their actions, and their willingness to declare the reasons of their actions when it should be desired. The Pastor declared that the week past the dissenting brethren had made use of the liberty at Charlestown in gathering into a church body of themselves, according to the advise of 2 councils in their case, with the approbation of Magistrates and Elders allowing to the law and had the right hand of fellowship given them by the Messengers from 5 Churches, so that he saw not any need of any further discourse about the contents of the former letter, at present. So it rested at the present. On the 27 day of November was observed a day of Thanksgiving for the mercies of the year, by order from General Court dated October 28.

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Letter from the
Pastor and Brethren
at Newbery

A letter was received and read on the Lords Day, from the Pastor and some brethren of the Church at Newbery their Elder signifying the divided and broken state of the Church there and earnestly entreating the Church here to send their Elders and a Messenger to help with others in the case, on the 3rd of November next. Our honoured brethren Major Hawthorn and Captain Price were sent as Messengers for this Church and were present at the time appointed. When they returned they shortly gave account that the Council was adjourned until the 19th day of April. At which time only the Pastor went from hence with the consent of the Church. (the other 2 brethren being hindered by weightly reasons.) At his returne from thence he made report unto the Church that though at first ther was a sad appearance of an irreconcilable breach, yet afterward the Lord was pleased so to blesse the motion made for Accomodation as to bow their hearts unto a Reconciliation on all sides. The Pastor being the leader acknowledging his own failings desiring forgiveness from God and them, and expressing his forgiveness of those that had appeared in opposition against him: many others did the like on both sides so there was a comfortable issue, they mutually binding themselves to observe the Directions of the Platforme of Discipline for time to come.¹

Council at Newbery

Thanksgiving

In the beginning of the 9th moneth an order was read from the generall Court for a day of thanksgiving on the 17th day with respect unto the mercies of the year past and in special with respect unto the merciful moderation of the raines that had threatened a Famine, which was observed at that time appointed. Also James Risings dismission was propounded and granted to Windsor Church.

On the day of the 4th moneth the Pastor propounded whether it might not be expedient to admit members on the Sabbath after the evening sermon, except when there were so many that it would take up too much time, which was assented to. Accordingly old Mrs Stileman having stood propounded a moneth and no exception against her was admitted by consent of the Church. The Pastor reading her relation and she consenting to the Covenant which was propounded to her. On the Sabbath day July 10:

Fast June 16

On the 16th day of June was observed a generall Fast by order and appointment of the General Court. Which order for the Memorableness of it is here inserted.

At a Generall Court held in Boston May the 11th 1670.

The Generall Court being sensible of Gods hand upon the country sundry years in divers afflicting Providences have been desirous to enquire into the causes thereof and amongst others doe conceive these following may be considered. i.e., a selfish spirit, minding more *our owne things than the things of Christ, and of private before the publick good.*²

[93] too much slightnes and negligence in prizing and improving the Government both civil and sacred in Church and Commonwealth. a great and generall neglect of instructing and governing the rising Generation both in Families and church; a cooling of former life and heat in Spirituall Communion; too great a neglect in some places of a comfortable upholding and providing for the outward subsistence of sundry faithful ministers; too much decay of love to God and one another, and harbouring groundles jealousies accompanied with whisperings, backbiting

which wayes tend to separate very Friends, too great abounding of sinne amongst us as pride, luxury, drunkennes, oppression, uncleannes and divers others. These with any¹ other sin that the Lord may upon enquiry convince his people of we desire may be confessed bewailed and a thorow Reformation endeavoured and for this purpose the Court doe appoint the 16 day of June next for a day of Humiliation to be kept throughout this Jurisdiction, and doe commend it to the Churches, Elders, Ministers and people to keep the same solemnly and seriously accordingly.

Admission of 5 members

On the 28th day of the 6 moneth Goodie Dod and Goodie Fortune of Marblehead having stood propounded a moneth were admitted to church membership after the usuall manner. On October 2 Goodie Wats² and Marget Ellis were also admitted after the usual manner.

On October 23 Mary Nowell was admitted to membership after the usual manner.

Thanksgiving

1671 On June 25. Mr. Elias Stileman his dismissal was propounded and granted with reference to his joyning with the church to be gathered at Portsmouth. Also Sister Wheeler was recommended to the Churches of New London and Norwich she living near to either of them. Also the beginning of this last winter was offered a day of publick thanksgiving by order of the Court.

At a Church Meeting March 22

Ropes
Lydia Neal
admonished

John Ropes and Lyddia Neal being children of the Covenant born and baptised in this church were publickly censured and admonished for the sin of Fornication which they had fallen into. The Admonition was consented to at this time by the vote of the Church and publickly dispensed by the Pastor the Lord's day following. Catechizing at the Pastor's house was also concluded on.

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J. Ropes forgiven

May. About 6 weeks after John Ropes was admitted on the Lord's day to make a poenitent confession of his sin which he did unto good satisfaction. 5 or 6 of the brethren witnessing for his poenitent disposition and conversation, there was an act of Church forgiveness passed by the pastor with the consent of the Church.

1672

Flendor

Jane Flendor was propounded a moneth, no exception being against her, she was on the Lords day received into membership in this Church in the ordinary way.

3 children of the
Covenant

Sarah Marsh borne and baptized in this church: Mrs. Corwin Senior borne and baptized in Plymouth Church, by a letter of Recommendation and dismission from Marshfield Church, also An Peas from Ipswich Church all these submitting to a private Examination by the Pastor, he declaring their fitness and they owning the covenant and they were admitted as those whose membership was acknowledged as others before them to use their liberty in partaking of the Lord's Supper.

Mr. Nicholets

Mr. Nicholets¹ coming to Salem from Virginia and preaching here several times he was in the issue invited to continue for one year in a way of trial as a help in preaching the Gospel; and that they would provide for his maintenance by Contribution, in the like case this was by a vote of the Church and people together on the Lords Day as had been done formerly. After some time he propounded his desire to joyn to the Church here, and stood publickly propounded according to the ordinary time, no objection being made, he did on the Lords day August² make his profession and engaging in the covenant he was received by vote of the church.

R. Raiment The dismissal of R. Raiment and his wife to Seabrook Church was propounded and consented to and accordingly sent unto him by the Pastor.

Mr Joseph Brown
G. Giggles Mr. J. Brown and G.¹ Giggles 2 of the children of the Covenant born and baptized in this church, they submitting to private examination of the Pastor and publickly owning the Covenant were admitted to full Communion on the Sacrament day, March 9.

Nurse Goody Nurse having stood propounded a moneth and having no just exception against her, but witnesses for her, she was admitted unto membership by confessing to the covenant and with the Churches consent after the usual manner.

1673

a Fast March 2 was kept as a day of publick fasting and prayer by consent of the Church and people here, with relation to the afflicted state of the Church and people of God abroad and also the signes and fears of approaching judgments towards ourselves. The day was carried on by Mr. Hale, Mr. Nicholets and the Pastor.

Mrs. Verin Mrs. Verin junior as a child of the covenant was admitted to full communion after the usuall way. June 1.

the Covenant Abigail Punchard and George Hardyes wife, as children of the Covenant were admitted to full communion in the usual way. Also Sara Giles by dismission from Linne.

Nov. 20 was a day of Thanksgiving kept by order of the Generall Court.

1674 April 11 on the Lords day Mr. Samuel Gardiner, Mary Gale, and Elizabeth Boyden were admitted to membership.

At a church meeting Nov 30, 1674

Attempt of gathering
a Church of Salem.
Non-Members
at Lyn.
December 8.

The Pastor acquainted the Brethren of the Church that he was informed by the Deputy Governor and Major Generall that T. Roots and Samuel Eburn had been with them for their approbation for themselves and their company to gather a church at Lyn on December 8. desired but they had expressed their non approbation, and by their advise the Pastor called this Church meeting to know whether the Church did approve of it or no. After debates and Agitation of the matter, upon many weighty Reasons that were alledged by many, it was voted by the generallity of the Brethren, that they did not approve of their sudden church-gathering, and therefore they desired them to forebear for the present that a matter of such weight might be done with more deliberation and better satisfaction. Unto such were added 6 Reasons.¹ The church also chose and desired Mr. Jo: Brown brother H. Skery, brother N. Felton and brother Ray to give notice of this vote and desire of theirs to T. Roots and company. Also they chose and desired Mr. William Brown, Mr. Batter, and Mr. Samuel Gardiner that in case they goe on to gather the Church there, that then these Brethren should go to Lin on Dec. 8. as Messengers from this church and there signify to the Assembly this vote and desire of the Church.

Frustrated

Accordingly on December 8. the Pastor and 2 of the foresaid Brethren went to Lin and did acquaint the Assembly there with this vote and desire of the Church. Also the Lord stirred up the Churches of Ipswich, Beverly and Rowly to send their Elders and Messengers to Lin, who joyned their desires with ours that there might be a present forbearance of their proceedings till there might be time for a hearing of the case.

Some of them

The issue of the day was that although the Elders and Messengers of other Churches that were desired by T. Roots, and proceeded to hear them make their

Order from the
governor and
Magistrate for
a Council:

On January 4 the Pastor received a letter of advise from the Governor and Council as followeth,

At a meeting of the Governor and Council held at Boston December 29, 1674, The Governor and Magistrates being Assembled in Council and being informed of the uncomfortable and unchristian difference now in Salem to the disturbance of the peace of the place and great grievance one to another, the regular and timely issue of which is the desire of all concerned to attend; They doe therefore commend it as their Advise and Counsel to the Church of Christ in that place, that before any further procedure be made in any of those things that are at present matters of offence to each other, that they possibly agree to nominate and request the presence of one or more organick Churches before whose Elders and Messengers those things that occasion their trouble being agitated and cleared according to the Order of the Gospell, through the Lords blessing and Assistance they may come to such an issue as may be to mutuall satisfaction, and the Scandall that will come by our divisions to the Name of the Lord, and the settled practise of these Churches may for the future be prevented. By the Council Edward Rawson Secretary.

3 Reasons why he
desired not
Mr. N [*icholet*] a 3d
year

The occasion of it was that the Pastor having concurred with the Church and people in April. '72, to desire Mr. N [*icholet*] continuance upon tryall for one year. He was desired a 2d year by a Town vote in a Town meeting without any concurrence or consent of Pastor; yet being done he saw cause not to oppose it, but upon triall and experience, in relation to a 3d year lest he should be prevented by a Town meeting in March, he saw cause to call a Church meeting February 19, when he gave 3 Reasons to the Church why he desired not his continuance a 3d year.

Reasons

1. Because it was his duty to desire the sincere milk of the Word. I Peter 2. 2. but upon so much tryall and experience He found such a mixture in his preaching that rendred his preaching not desirable, neither for himself not for the people here.
2. Because it was his duty to love the truth and peace. Zach. 8. 19. but he found the Truth and Peace was much endangered by his continuance here so long.
3. He found no assistance nor help from him, but much affliction and oppression which he lay under by his means.

These Reasons he propounded to the consideration of the Brethren of the Church, whether they might not be Reasons also to them to concur in a vote, that he may have timely notice of it to provide for himself elsewhere.

This being allowed 4 months before the end of the 2d year which ended June 13. Some of Brethren desiring it, the Pastor gave 5 severall Instances upon which there was many howers debate; some of the Brethren speaking one way, and some another, the Pastor severall times propounded to put it to vote; but by some of the chief of brethren being desired to forbear saying if the Pastor had the major vote with

him, that the minor part either might or would joyn with the Town and have him notwithstanding. So the fearing a Breach, he satisfied himself with this that he had Discharged his own duty, and therefore did not put it to a vote.

Mr. N[*icholet*] call
a Towne meeting

In the beginning of March at a Town meeting, Mr. N[*icholet*] was generally desired by a Town vote to continue a 3d year. Before the passing of which vote they sent for the Pastor Nicholet desiring to know his mind. His answer was yes.¹

[95] They knew his minde allready, which he had declared in the Church meeting; but it being replied that the Town generally desired his continuance a 3d year, the Pastor expressed himself that if they did so yet upon his 3 former Reasons he could not concurre with them nor consent thereunto, and therefore should be onely passive therin, he should not oppose.

Town call of
Mr. N[*icholet*] for
life

In the moneth of September Mr. N[*icholet*] began and went on to preach 9 Farwell sermons of a Parting Minister as if he intended to remove, but the issue was that October 29 in a town meeting He was desired by the town to stay during life. The lecture following He expressed himself to accept of their call. Not long after which there was an attempt of divers of the non members to gather another Church in this place.

Ordination
at Wenham

On January 10 on the Lords day there was a letter read from the Churches of Wenham desiring us to send messengers to be present at the Ordination of Mr. Geerish³ The Church accordingly sent Mr. Batter and brother H. Skery who were present at the ordination at Wenham on the 13th day, and to-

gether with Messengers of other churches did approve of the proceedings then as Mr Batter afterwards gave an account unto the Church.

At a Church meeting January 18, 1674

The letter of advise from the Governor and Council was first read. Then the Pastor acquainted the Brethren of the Church that there were 5 things to be considered of. 1. whether the Church would accept of this advise. 2. to prepare matters for the Council, 3. what churches to send to, 4. at what time, 5. how to bear the charges of it, And that the 2 first were of present consideration. The first of these was thus propounded, whether the church did accept of this Advise and Consent to have a Council in convenient time if we could not agree amongst our selves.

Quest.

The Pastor expressed his acceptance of this Advise, and so did the Honored Major Hawthorne and generally all the Brethren that spake, onely upon the desire of many not to have it voted, the Pastor did forebear to put it to vote. In relation to the 2d, divers things were mentioned as matter for a Council. But the Church generally enclined to consider of matter of Agreement, in order to which some things were at present mentioned and left unto Consideration. But finding ourselves in a hazardous posture needing help from Heaven it was agreed first to have a day of Humiliation to seek the Lord for his mercy and help in our case. On February 18, the day after another Church meeting the day of Humiliation was carried on by the Pastor and Mr. Nicholet.

At a Church meeting Febr. 19, 1674.

Exceptions against
Mr N[*icholet*]

The Pastor produced some exceptions in relation to Mr. Nicholets doctrine and practise, and read them to the Church then assembled, professing the reason why he had not done it sooner was He did hope that a friendly conference with some Elders might have brought it to a good issue long before this. But now He found it necessary to doe it in this way, in dis-

charging his duty of Pastor of this Church upon his account unto Jesus Christ. Having no other end but (that if it be the will of God) there might be nothing but the sincere milk of the Word in this place; and that the obstructions being removed, his Ministry may be acceptable and profitable in this place.

Which Exceptions being read and spoken to by the Pastor, by Mr. Nicholet, and by divers of the Brethren for severall howers together, Mr. Nicholet did in some things explain his meaning, in other things he did profess (that as they had been expressed) they were not his Judgment and though he professed he had not willingly designed to bring in any Error, or to corrupt the Word of God, yet He confessed He had out of weakness used unsafe expressions, and that he hoped that what He had understood to be offensive to others, He should be more watchful and carefull to avoyd the same for time to come.

This Acknowledgment of Mr. Nicholet was in the issue voted as accepted for Satisfaction with respect unto all that was past. At the same time Mr. Joseph Brown desired and obtained his dismissal to the Church of Charlestown by the vote of the Church.

At a Church meeting Febr. 25: 74:

Brother Phipeny
admonished

The case of Brother Phipeny was considered, he having long absented himself from the Lords Supper upon occasion of a difference between him and Brother H. Skery about which much time was spent and many of the Brethren did speak The issue was he not making any acknowledgement of his Error to Satisfaction He was by a clear vote of the Church layd under a censure of Admonition from Ephesians 5: 14: Warn the unruly and from I Corinthians 11.31.

Samuel Hebbert¹
admonished

Also at the same time, brother Hebbert brought his son Samuel Hebbert, as a child of the Covenant who was by the vote of the Church layd under the Censure of Admonition for the sin of uncleanness (for

which he had been fined) from Ephesians 3-4, 5.6 which was applied unto him.

Also another church meeting was agreed on, on March 11 to deal with sundry other of the children of the Covenant which had ——¹

Rebecca Bly and Lydia Hart, who had been formerly censured by the Church for the Sin of uncleanness being called they did appear and though they could speak little themselves, yet severall brethren witnessing for them, and that they did hope they had been made sensible of their sinne, and had some degree of Repentance, there was a generall inclination in a charitable way to accept of it as Satisfaction, and so they were forgiven and released from the censure by the vote of the Church. But it was declared that such are not hereby admitted to full communion.

Nathaniel Peas
Excommunicated

Nathaniel Peas having been severall times warned to appear before the Church, on 2 Church meeting dayes and 2 Sabbath dayes He not comeing at all, but refusing to come, was by the vote of the Church declared a Non-member of this Church as the lowest degree and expression of Excommunication.

Hun

On a Sabbath following, the wife of Nathaniel Hun appeared and submitted to the Censure of the Church, which was dispensed then, for uncleanness.

Attempt for another
meeting howse

This spring the greatest number of the town, and many of the Church joyning with them, attempted the building of another meeting howse, which they carryed on to such a forwardness as to rayse the roof of it upon the green, they were so confident as to joyn in a Petition to the Generall Court for their Approbation of Mr. Nicholet to be minister therein; the General Court appointed a committee to consider the case, who came to Salem on June 8, 1675. After

3 dayes hearing of the case, they gave in a Result, all their hands to it, which for the memorableness of it is here recorded.

Committee of the
Courts Result

We the Committee of the Generall Court mett at Salem having given free and publick liberty to each partie to express themselves in the matters of their present differences unto a full hearing of the case committed to us cannot but first manifest deep and sorrowfull sense, of the sinful causes, sad concomitants and fruits of the unbrotherly distance of affection and spirit of contention which hath been so long prevayling in the Church, and amongst the inhabitants there. More especially we have observed to our great grief how much advantage Satan is getting by those strange and sinfull Animosities and highly reflecting and provoking cariages and expressions that have passed between those that are chief in this place, whose disunion in no wise consists with the flourishing and much to be desired efficacy and beauty of Civil and Sacred order amongst the people all which wee do sollemnly bear our testimonie against, and that we may further attend the Errand about which wee are sent and in some measure (as God shall be pleased to give success) attaine the great end aimed at by the Honoured Court wee declare and advise as followeth.

1. Wee declare the Course and way that hath been attended in the calling and settling of Mr. Nicholet as a Preacher by a promiscuous vote of the Towne is very irregular and expressly contrary to known wholesome lawes of this jurisdiction and of dangerous tendencie and influence as to the state and order of the Churches here established. And alike irregular and of evill consequences wee declare the generall voting of such Inhabitants in Town affayres who are not expressly qualified so to vote by law.

2. As an Expedient for the Recovery and settlement of peace and order of this place, we advise and direct they doe seriously endeavour a mutuall agreement to walk together in Love and for that End.

1. That the wholl Church and Town meet together in a publick day of Humiliation to be set apart to that end, and that the work of the day be carryed on by the Reverend Pastor Mr. Higginson and Mr. Nicholet that the wholl assembly may humble themselves before God for past irregularities and seek Reconciliation with him and one with another, and so the work of publick preaching for

2. the future be carried on joyntly by Mr. Higginson and Mr. Nicholet as before, that so the wholl people may be in a way of mutuall accord,

3. and when there shall be need of issuing forth into another congregation so weighty a work may be done with mutuall Love and Satisfaction, and according to the Rules of Gods word and the Lawes here established.

At the same time when the Committee was here at Salem there came newes that Philip and the Indians began to make warre against the English in Plimouth Colony, There were soldiers sent from this Colonie to joyne with those of Plimouth; Afterwards the Warre proved more dangerous than was expected, both to the Eastward and on Connecticut River, the Indians burning, spoyling, and killing many of the English in many towns. The warre continued all the Summer and also the winter following, in which time by the order of the Court and Council there were sundry dayes of Fasting and prayer appointed and observed here in Salem as in other Churches and places in this Colony as on June 29, and on October

7th and on December 2, and on January 12th. Many companies of Horse and foot being also sent forth, many of our men were killed and the Anger of God manifested against the Country.

12 Evills to
be Reformed

The Generall Court apprehending the Lord called us to Reformation as well as Humiliation, they considered what might be the provoking Evills which might procure the Judgments of God upon the Countrey, and upon mature deliberation they inserted in the new added lawes printed and published the last sessions of the Court at Boston 12 provoking Evills requiring and urging a generall and effectual Reformation in these things some of which doe in a particular manner concern the Elders and Brethren []¹ Churches.

Narrative read

After which the Pastor read a Narrative of the Acknowledgement of the members children in the Church in Salem from the beginning, Also of the present Actings in Church affayres with the consent of the Brethren of the Church and that He had industriously aimed at the discharge of duty toward the Church and the Covenant and had done much that way so farre as He had the Concurrence of the Brethren with him, till the late obstructions.

Pastor attending every 2d day.

He propounded therefore to all the Brethren for their concurrence countenance and encouragement in this work according to 2 Scriptures. Ezra: 10.4. Ephesians 4:16 and as an Expedient for the reducing of it into practice that He should attend every 2d day at one o clock at his own howse for the end that any Parents may bring their children to tryall in order to their taking hould of the Covenant and admission to full communion, and to bringing any other with them. Also any Non-Members that any of the Brethren shall approve of to bring them and come along with them for their tryall in order to membership. Also to attend any Scandalle with respect to Discipline.

Catechizing

Also that every 2d week He would attend Catechizing on the 5th and 6th day as formerly.

Pastor maintenance not payd according to Engagement

There was a consent of the Brethren by Vote for the tryall of the Bay Psalme Book for half a year. And also the Pastor gave notice to the Church Meeting (as he had done before to the Selectmen on January 13) that the maintenance engaged to him for his support according to the Engagement voted and recorded in July 1671, viz. that He should have 100£ in money per annum and 40 cord of wood, the money to be paid 25£ a quarter, which though it was done well the years '72 and 73 yet for the year 74 and 75 it hath not been performed especially this last year

ending at January 1, That He had been faine to borrow 50£ for the necessities of his Family, which 50£ was due to him now this last January 1, therefore: that He had borrowed 20£ of the 2 Deacons of one of the Churches of Boston, He desired therefore that care might be had that the 50£ might be payd for the payment of his debts by March the 1st, and that the Deacons may see to it, also that He did expect the performance of that Engagement for the time to come, viz. 25£ April 1 next etc.; or He could not see howe He should be able to live and continue amongst them.

Account of the

September 7 being the Sacrament day the Pastor being returned from Boston gave an account to the Church what was done at the Synod, viz. that after the reading over and considering the Platform of Discipline published by the Synod in the year 1648 it was agreed on by the vote of the Synod, nemine contradicente that we do all own, approve and profess the same for the substance of it as the profession of these Churches, Also, that in answer to the questions propounded by the Court, there was an Agreement in severall things propounded in writing as provoking Evils in this time of Gods Judgments and the Remedies thereof, as to the Substance, End, and Scope of them by the unanimous Vote of the Synod. Also, a Confession of Faith to be drawn up by a

Committee agreed upon and presented to the Synod which adjourned till the week before the next Court of Election.

There was a unanimous vote of the Church granting the desire of the Brethren and sisters of Marblehead, that they (and their children) might become a Church of themselves. Afterwards, they did signify to the Church, that they had agreed upon August 13, when they intended (if the Lord pleas to joyn in Church Fellowship together) and also to choos and ordain Mr. Cheevers Pastor of their Church. They desired also the presence of Messengers from this Church as also from the Churches of Lin, Beverly, Wenham and Ipswich.

On the foresaid August 13, after Mr. Cheevers had prayed and preached, he presented and read a Confession of Faith and Covenant which they had all considered of and agreed upon amongst themselves, and which then they did express their consent unto. And so they were owned and approved by the Elders and Messengers of the Churches present as a particular and distinct Church of Christ amongst themselves. Then the Brethren of the Church by their vote expressing their calling and election of Mr. Cheever to be their Pastor, who was ordained by the laying on of the hands of the Pastor of Salem together with 3 other Elders, Mr. Hubbard of Ipswich was desired to give the Right hand of Fellowship, and the Pastor of Salem to mannage the wholl action.¹

Accordingly being mett together the Pastor informed them, that they might remember that the Synod book containing the Scripture grounds for 7 proposals touching the subject of Baptisme has been (allmost 20 years since) read and considered in the Church, and that then they consented to the Baptizing of the children of such parents as were born in the Church or received with their parents in minority though they be not yet admitted to the Lords Supper, and according to the scope of the Synods 5th proposition, and accordingly we have practised ever since. But as time and experience hath shewed there are many other cases wherin we are as yet defective in Baptizing.

As in the case of 1) the children of such Brethren as have scrupled that Baptizing any infants at all that are grown up and yet are unbaptized, and they have children also. 2) the children of other churches who live amongst us and they have children also 3) the children of Church members whose Parents are dead 4) the Children of such Christians as live amongst us, though not members of this or any other particular Church; the Pastor and Teacher both did express their own judgments: that in these and such like cases the children ought to be Baptized as well as those we do allready. viz., the parents submitting to the Examination of the Elders, and we finding them qualified as those whose children we have hitherto baptized though they dare not as yet offer themselves to the Lords Supper. They also professed they intended not the Baptizing of the children of all promiscuously, viz. not of any ignorant scandalous persons who contradict the profession of Christianity. The Pastor also expressed that the reason why he had forborn to Baptizing sundry of these cases hitherto was for want of the Brethrens consent. But now they met with so many such cases of those that did frequently importunately desire Baptism for their children that they could no longer forbear, but desired to have the Consent of the Brethren that they might act freely in Baptizing according their own judgments;

Reasons

and that for such Reasons as these 1.) Because Baptizing belongs to their office: Mat. 28. 19, Luke 12. 42, Heb. 13. 17, 2.) These and such like cases are included in the Scripture grounds of the Synod in 1662.3.) Though Brethren differ in their Apprehensions about Baptizing, yet they may on the principle of Forbearing one another in love, consent to their Elders to Act in things belonging to their own office according to their own light. I Thessalonians 2. 4., I Timothy 1. 11, Ephesians 4. 2. Also Mr. Noys the Teacher did fully and freely express himselfe to concur with the Pastor in this matter, not merely in way of compliance, but as his own judgment perswaded.

In the Agitation, discourse and conference about this matter many of the chief of the Brethren did express themselves as concurring in judgment with the Pastor and Teacher, and that they thought they should not onely have liberty but countenance and encouragement in their way and work, and though some others of the Brethren that were otherwise minded did express their scruples, fears and doubts, yet they would not oppose but suffer the Elders to act peacably in this matter. - June 12 Mary Robinson wife of Samuel Robinson Junior entered into covenant and came under the watch and care of the Church, having bene examined and propounded she was baptized.

The same Sabbath after sacrament was appointed a meeting of the church Brethren at the house of our teacher at one of the clock in the afternoon to consult about several matters of great importance, and to do what should be judged the duty of the church

relating to such cases as should be propounded, the meeting to be on March the 8th.

March 8 The Brethren of the Church met together at the Teachers house at the time appointed at which meeting of the church the following particulars were agreed upon and consented to by the vote of the Church.

1. That for the time to come on every publick fast day and every publick Thanksgiving day after sermon, the Deacons of this Church shall ask of the whole Assembly that come together to worship the Lord, a contribution for the poor.
2. That the mony gatherd by these contributions or anything else given in Notes be bestowed on the poor of this church especially, and yet so as compassionate regard be had in the distribution to any of the poor that are wont to worship God with us in the same meeting house.
3. That the mony and goods of any kind gatherd by these contributions shall be distributed to the poor as above, according to the discretion of the Deacons of the Church, and such two of the selectmen as shall be desired annually by the minister or ministers of the church to joyn with the Deacons in the distribution.
4. That if any contraversy shall arise betwixt the distributors of the mony and goods collected, about the distribution that it shall be decided by the minister or ministers joyning with them in the distribution.
5. That the Deacons shall keep a fair record of the several summes given at the several times by the Assembly and record the names of the persons to whom any of this contribution mony or goods is given, and the summes given to them, in some one of the Church books to be seen of any, as occasion shall serve.
6. That the mony and goods Received by the contribution shall be kept in the Deacons hands till the distribution be made.

7. That the above-mentioned directions and appointments of the church at this meeting concerning the contribution on fast days and Thanksgiving days shall be observed untill at some meeting of the church the church shall see reason, otherwise to direct and appoint.

At the same church meeting The church desired and appointed our Brethren Major Samuel Brown, Captain Samuel Gardner and Mr. Daniel Epes to inspect the accounts of the Deacons for the time past concerning the maintenance of the Lords table, that it may be known what the church is indebted to them, and who of the members are indebted to the church and how much, that the blame may be only on such of the church, as sinfully neglect to bring in to the Deacons, their part of what was agreed on by the church for the maintenance of the Lords table, and that care may be taken to bring such to a more ready performance of their duty.

At the same church meeting it was consented to, that if any pleaded poverty as the reason of their neglect, that the case should be considered by the ministers and Deacons of the Church, and if they judged the plea and excuse good it should be forgiven them [*but that*]¹ they must expect to bring into the Deacons []² and that the church ask [118] and will require it of them.

At the same meeting also it was agreed and voted by the church that that our Brethren Major Samuel Brown, Captain Samuel Gardner and Mr. Daniel Epes, should inspect the accounts of monys received by the Deacons at several contributions formerly given for the poor and their distributions of those summes for the satisfaction of the church, and the discharging the deacons of the summs so received and distributed.

At the same church meeting it was agreed that for time to come and until the church take further order, that the several members of the church

whether men or women shall yearly sometime in the month of March bring into the Deacons 2 shillings and sixpence each of them for the maintenance of the Lords table, (such only excepted as the Ministers and Deacons shall excuse on the account of the poor circumstance they are in) and that it shall be accounted scandalous for any to neglect so to do, if after the Deacons have demanded it they shall still neglect to do it and they shall be lyable to answer for their neglect before the church.

At the same meeting it was propounded to the Brethren that any of them that had children or other relations or neighbors that were children of the church that had faln into scandalous evils that had not manifested their repentances before the church that they should exhort and admonish them to bring forth fruit meet for repentance and seek reconciliation with the church by offering a publick confession of their sin, for the glory of God, and the prevention of further censure, And a Record of the church produced wherein it is said that for the time to come it was expected the brethren should bring forth such as were scandalous.

At the same meeting of the church was considered the case of Elizabeth Allin wife of Jacob Allin, who for forsaking the Church and the ordinances of Christ, and living in the profession and practice of Quakerism, and refusing to appear before the church when orderd so to do, lay under the censure of admonition and suspension dispensed to her by the churches sending the teacher of the church with two of the brethren, who did accordingly admonish her and give returne of their so doing to the church, where upon the church agreed to wait yet longer, if perhaps God might give her repentance. The Church now considered that notwithstanding many years waiting and using much clemency and patience towards her, she hath hitherto refused to hear the church. They thought it necessary to send yet once more to see if she will yet hear the church, and judging it duty to procede to renounce communion with her in case she still persist in the error of her way and therefore desired two of the brethren viz.

Mr. Daniel Epes and Mr. John Pickering to urge her to repentance and to hear the church, and to signify to her that otherwise she must expect to be excommunicated.

At the same church meeting also the church was informed that our Sister Tamzin Hill did forsake the church and ordinances and went to the meeting of the Quakers, and that notwithstanding means used by the teacher of the church to reclaim her whereupon it was agreed that 3 of our brethren viz. Mr. Daniel Epes, Deacon Maston, and Mr. Samuel Ruck should be sent to her to enquire into the reason of her forsaking the church and the ordinances of Christ and to exhort her to return to the Church and not forsake the Christian Religion which she had professed, and that she would not break the Covenant she had solemnly made with God and with the church and that they should make return to the church of their so doing and of her replies to them.

At the same church meeting with the consent of the Brethren of the church was given unto our Brother John Massey¹ an old great church Bible it having bene often sent to Aged people and misusd, and not like to be any way more serviceable, then by giving it to some aged person, and he being considered as the first Town bornd child, it was given to him and deliverd to him before the brethren.

March 28

The widow Mrs. Sarah Bowditch having stood propounded one month, and nothing objected against her was upon the reading of her profession of her faith and confession of the sin of excessive drinking to which she had bene formerly bene addicted enterd into Covenant and was joynd to the church with the consent of the Brethren.

Abigail Birch having been guilty of the sin of fornication made a pœnitent confession of her sin, and was reconciled to the church, upon her renewing Covenant and had liberty of having her child baptized.

- April 3 A meeting of the brethren of the church was appointed to be at our Teachers house at Two of the clock in the afternoon to consider of something of great importance that the Teacher had to propose to them, the meeting to be on the day following being the 4th day of this instant month.
- 4 Accordingly the brethren met at the time and place appointed, and the Teacher declared to them his inability to carry on the whole worke of the Ministry here himselfe alone and that he dare not in conscience undertake the charge of so many souls, for he found by experience he was not able to do it, Now in his declining age, and infirmity dayly growing upon him, and insisted upon it that when he was first called and ordained to be a Minister in Salem it was to be an Assistant to the Reverend Mr. Higginson now with the Lord, and therefore he did not intend neither was it desired or required of him that he should do the whole work himselfe alone, and that now he was Twenty six years older¹ than he was then, and not able to do now, what he could do then, moreover he declared that although the far greater part of the work had bene carried on by him, during the very old age, and infirm state of said Mr. Higginson yet he had not borne it so long without asking helpe had it not beene that the Town had bene in a low state, by reason of the wars and losses that they sustaind at sea, and so were unable to maintain three ministers and such was the state of Mr. Higginson and his wife by reason of continual sickness, and infirmity, that he needed his full maintenance as much or more then when he was able to carry on his work, and consequently no help could be had in a standing way, without maintaining these ministers, which he thought the Town would not consent to and that they could not have well performed it, if they had promised it. But the case did not stand as before seeing Mr. Higginson was departed this life

and needed not. And therefore the charge would not be increased, but rather lessened to what it was before although another should be chosen to assist in the work of the ministry according as the brethren desired. Whereupon the brethren of the church being desired to speak freely their minds relating to another minister, did generally declare they thought the declaration and also the motion for another to assist in the ministry was but reason [*able*] and that they were convinct the teacher wanted help that such a great congregation needed two ministers. And the Brethren of the church then consented and agreed that a day of prayer with fasting should be set apart to seek the favor of God and his direction and blessing in order to the obtaining another minister. And that the day should be observed in publick in the meeting house, and that the whole Assembly should be informed of it, and be desired and invited to joyn with us in the worship of God on that day the occasion of it being of equal importance to them with the church, and the pitching upon the day for prayer and fasting was left to the Teacher that he might discourse with the Elders in the neighbourhood and might have some helpe in the carrying on the work of the day and the meeting ended saving that as we begun the meeting with prayer so likewise it was ended with prayer, and thanksgiving to God that he had given us a peaceable and successful meeting. The teacher having spoke with the Elders, pitcht upon the 20th day of April being our lecture day to be the day of prayer, and on the Sabbath foregoing that lecture day Notified the Assembly of what he had declared to and desired of the church and did also then make the same declaration to the whole Assembly. and desired them also to consent that another Minister should be called to assist in the work of the Ministry and declared to them how the church and himselfe did most earnestly desire that all the Assembly would attend the publick worship on that day and joyn with us in observing the said day for the forementioned ends.

April 20 The church and the Assembly Generally appeared at the meeting house and religiously observed the day. The Reverend Mr. Green¹ preached on part of the day and the Reverend Mr. Blower² prayed before his sermon. And in the Afternoon the Reverend Mr. Gerrish³ prayed before sermon and Teacher preached.

May 1 Mr. Joshua Pitman having been examined personally owned the Covenant.

The same day After the Sacrament it was agreed that on the ninth of May there should be a meeting of the brethren of the church at the Teachers house to consider what was proper to be done next in order to the choosing and calling another minister, and to procede to nominating and choosing one in order to settlement in case the church so agreed.

- 9 Accordingly on the Ninth of May 1709, the Brethren of the church generally met at the Teachers house, and after prayer to God for direction the matter for which the meeting was appointed came into consideration and after a friendly agitation concerning the method of nominating and chusing one to assist in the ministry as abovesaid the several votes following passed.

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1. It was proposed whether the church should procede any further as to Nominating and chusing a minister as abovesaid at this time or no?

And by a General vote, by holding up the hand it was agreed in the affirmative.

2. It was proposed whether Mr. George Corwin should be the first in Nomination in order to the Chusing and calling of a Minister to Assist in the Ministry as abovesaid or no? Which was also voted and generally agreed in the affirmative. This vote was also by lifting up the hand.
3. It was proposed whether the Brethren of the Church do chuse and call M^r George Corwin to be the Minister to assist in the Ministry as above said in order to settlement as abovesaid or no?

And farther, in case the said Mr. George Corwin be chosen and called as abovesaid, whether it should be proposed to the inhabitants that come to our meeting in Salem, in order to their joyning with us in the abovesaid chusing and calling the said Mr. George Corwin in order to Settlement ? or no ?

Both which proposals were voted, and generally agreed to by holding up the hand, in the affirmative. These votes being passed as above, the meeting was ended with prayer and thanksgiving to God for the good agreement.

May 6 Daniel Epes Esquire, Samuel Brown Esquire and Deacon Maston were chosen by the church after Sacrament was done, to go with our Teacher to the Reverend Mr. George Corwin to signify to him the churches choosing and calling him to Assist our teacher, in the work of the ministry in order to settlement with us and to pray his acceptance, and that in conjunction with those worthy Gentlemen John Higginson Esquire William Hirst Esquire and Josiah Woolcot Esquire who were chosen and desired to joyn with the messengers of the church in waiting on the Reverend Mr. George Corwin to signify this Parishes concurring with the churches vote passed on May 9th 1709, concerning the choosing and calling Mr. George Corwin to assist in the work of the Ministry here, on the proposal voted at the Parish meeting cald for that end on May 3d. 1711. For it must be noted that notwithstanding the parish had voted a non concurrence upon the 2d January 1709 with the churches choice, yet there was liberty according to law, for the church to appeal to a council of churches, which liberty was also desired by the Teacher in the churches behalfe in case they should desire it, but while the matter hung in suspence and was under deliberation whether it was best for the church to Appeal to a council or no, Seing though there was a prospect of the churches obtaining their choice that way, yet it was doubted whether it would consist with the peace of the place, and comfort of Mr. Corwin, to be brought in by a council; after the major part of the parish had voted a non concurrence with the church; it so came to pass that many of the inhabitants living without the Town bridge obtaind of the Generall Court a district to be a parish by themselves, which occasioned a letter to be sent by many of the church and parish to the Teacher desiring that the matter relating to the concurence of the parish with the churches vote concerning the chosing and calling of Mr. George Corwin to Assist in the ministry here in order to Settlement might be

brought on again, a copy of which letter is here inserted.

To the Reverend Mr. Nicholas Noyes Preacher of the church of Christ of Salem.

Sir, It is the request and desire of several of the members of the church and principal inhabitants of your Parish who are ready and willing to Encourage and afford you help and Assistance in the great work of the ministry.

Whereas, we are not insensible of your often indisposition of body and your growing onto years, and the great charge you have upon you, that calls for helpe and assistance, which you have often manifested your desire for, and in order to which the church did sometime the last year proceed to the choice of an Assistant to you in the work of the ministry, and did then make choice of the Reverend Mr. George Corwin for that end, which afterward being brought to the Parish where a Negative was passed: which we judge was chiefly occasioned by the design of many for a new Precinct, which they having obtained from the General court,¹ we now judge it proper again to bring forward the churches vote, to the Parish, not doubting but that now, you may have help, and a vote of the Parish may be easily obtaind confirming the churches vote for Mr. George Corwin if he will accept of a maintenance as may be collected on the Lords days by a sure contribution, which we doubt not but will be an Handsome and suitable support to him and we shall willingly and readily do and contribute what is proper on our parts and Encourage others of the church and Parish to do the like for his maintenances; wherefore we pray that you will promote the same as God in his wisdom shall direct you. And that you may long continue as a rich blessing to this church and Parish is the hearty desire and prayer of the subscribers are 109.²
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Salem April 1711.

The Teacher having received this letter thought it the most probable and hopeful way for to obtain peace in Salem, and to bring about good agreement between the church and the Parish, and for both to have another minister and himself assistance in the worke of the ministry, which he was not able to carry on alone, did therefore desire of the Selectmen that a meeting of the Parish might be appointed by them, that under the present circumstances it might be seen whether the Parish now would vote a concurrence with the vote of the church for the choosing and calling the Reverend Mr. George Curwin to assist in the worke of the ministry here. And the Selectmen readily granted the Teachers desire and appointed and legally warned a meeting of the Parish for the end abovesaid to be on the 3d of May 1711. At which meeting the following votes passed, which were taken out of the Town Records.

Salem SS. At a meeting of the Freeholders and other inhabitants of the Town who live within the Town Bridge and to the southward of the high road, of the high Road to Lynn as also those on Royal side duely qualified according to law, being duely warned assembled at the usual place May 3d 1711.

Proposed, whereas the Church did make choice of Mr. George Corwin for an assistant to the Reverend Mr. Nicholas Noyes in the worke of the ministry here, and a consent and concurrence of the inhabitants of this Parish being desired at this time, voted that this Parish doth concurre with the church, and do also make choice of the said Mr. George Corwin for the end aforesaid who shall have for his support what shall be Raised by a free contribution which shall be asked on the Lords days.

On May the 8th the Teacher with the messengers of the church and also of the Parish waited on the Reverend Mr. George Corwin and showed to him the votes of the church and of the Parish Relating to his being chosen and called to Assist in the work of a ministry here in order to Settlement and prayed his acceptance of being chosen and called as above, both by the church and Parish and of the proposal made for his maintenance by a voluntary contribution on the Lords days so we left our proposals and desires with him for his consideration and Answers. And the Reverend Mr. George Corwin gave his Answer in writing, on May 11, 1711 which is as followeth:

To the Reverend Mr. Nicholas Noyes with the Honourable Gentlemen of the Church and Parish chosen to treat with me, to be communicated to the first church and Parish in Salem.

I received your proposals in order to a settlement in the work of the ministry among you, and am very sensible of your respect therein shown to me, which proposals having seriously considered, I do accept thereof, intending by the grace and help of God to assist in the work of the ministry so long as you shall afford a comfortable subsistence. In the meantime desiring your prayers that I may be made an able minister of the New Testament and may finish my ministry with joy. That you may be Edified and the work of God succeeded among you by the labours of him who is willing to serve you in the Gospel of Christ.

Salem May 11th, 1711.

May 13 Mr. Corwins Answer was communicated to the church and the whole Assembly on the next Lords day after the 2nd meeting was done, and so he began his Ministry with us, and the first contribution for him was on May 20, 1711. Lord give us Peace and the blessings of the Gospel of peace. Amen.

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June 3 Thomas Palphry having bene propounded for full communion and examined renewed the covenant and was received to full communion with the consent of the Brethren.

July 1st Silence Rogers the wife of Daniel Rogers having bene examined and propounded on June 24 Entered into Covenant with us and was received to full communion with the church the brethren consenting.

8 Nathaneel Phippen ownd the covenant and had his child baptized.

29 was a Publick Fast appointed by the Governor, to begge the blessing of God on the expedition to Canada and 9 August was also a general publick fast on the same occasion.

Sept. 16 Elizabeth wife of Malachi Foot having bene examined owned the covenant.

Oct. 7 Samuel Ropes having bene examined personally owned covenant and Lydia his wife having bene examined and stood propounded 2 weeks enterd into covenant and was Baptized.

the Reverend Mr. Samuel Phillips was dismissed from this church to joyn in church Fellowship with the church in the south part of Andover.¹

The comminicans in the south part of Andover desird the Elders and Messengers of this church to be present with them on October 17, to joyn with the Elders and messengers of other churches to counsel and help them in their Imbodying and becoming a

church themselves and the ordaining the Reverend Mr. Samuel Phillips to be their pastor. The Elders not being able to go to the church chose and desired Major Sewal Esquire and the Reverend Mr. George Corwin and Captain Peter Osgood to go as messenger from this church and they did go and the offices of the day were orderly carried on, the church embodied and Mr. Philips ordained their pastor.

- 28 Doctor Thomas Barton and his wife, and Elizabeth Barton, his sister, and Lois wife of Timothy Orn, and Mrs. Hanna White, and Mary, and Abigail Foot were propounded in order to full communion with the church, and having bene examined, and propounded and nothing objected against either of them they all renewed their covenant with God, and the church, and were well received to full communion with the church before the Sacrament with the consent of the Brethren.

- March 2 Mrs. Pratt, wife of Mr. John Pratt, personally owning the Covenant was with the Consent of the Brethren received to full Communion.
- After the Sacrament, a church meeting was appointed to be at the Teachers house att 2 of the Clock in the afternoon on the 6th of the Month, being Thursday.
- 6 On which day they Accordingly mett to consider of the several following particulars propounded to them by the Teacher. Viz: 1. Whether the Record of the Excommunication of our Sister Nurse (all things considered) may not be Erased and blotted out —
The Result of which Consideration was:

[127] That whereas on July 3rd 1692, it was proposed by the Elders, and consented to by an Unanimous vote of the Church that said Sister Nurse should be Excommunicated, she being convicted of witchcraft by the Court and she was accordingly Excommunicated; Since which the General Court having taken off the Attainder, and the Testimony on which she was convicted being not now so Satisfactory to ourselves, and others as it was generally in that hour of Darkness and Temptation: And we being Solicited by her Son Mr. Samuel Nurse, to Rase and blott out of the Church Records the Sentence of her Excommunication. This Church having the matter propos'd to it by the Teacher and having Seriously considered it, doth consent that the Record of said Sister Nurse's Excommunication be accordingly Rased and blotted out; that it may no longer be a Reproach to her Memory, and an Occasion of grieffe to her Children, Humbly requesting that the mercifull God would pardon. whatsoever Sin, Error or Mistake, was in the Application of that Censure and of that whole affair Through our Mercyfull high priest, Who knoweth how to have Compassion on the Ignorant, and those that are out of the way.

2. It was proposed whether the Sentence of Excommunication against our Brother Giles Corey (all things considered) may not be Erased, and blotted out. The Result of which was

That whereas on Sepr. 18th, 1692, it was considered by the Church that our Brother Giles Corey stood accused of and Indicted for the Sin of Witchcraft, And that he had obstinately refused to plead, and so threw himself on certain Death.

It was agreed by the vote of the Church that he should be Excommunicated for it; And accordingly he was Excommunicated. Yet the Church having now Testimony in his behalf, that before his Death he did bitterly repent of his obstinate refusal to plead in defence of his Life: Do consent that the sentence of his Excommunication be Erased and blotted out.

3. Something was proposed with relation to the Legacy left to the Church by Benjamin Brown Esquire. The Result whereof was

At a Church meeting at the Teacher's House, in the First Parish in the Town of Salem, March 6, 1711/

1712 Whereas Benjamin Brown Esquire Late of Salem, deceased, gave and bequeathed by his Last Will and Testament Fifty Pounds, money to this Church; About the one half thereof to be Improved for purchasing a Silver Baptismal Bason, and the other half thereof to be Improved (the Income thereof) towards the Discharging of the Expence for Provision for the Sacrament on behalf of the poorest members of the said Church who cannot well pay for themselves — And forasmuch as Colonel Samuel Brown, Esquire and Captain Jonathan Brown Executors of the Last Will and Testament of Benjamin Brown Esquire aforementioned deceased have punctually paid in to the Reverend Mr. Nicholas Noyes or Teacher, the afore named Legacy —

Viz: a Silver Bason of Twenty five pounds Value; And Twenty five pounds more in Silver Money at Eight Shillings per Oz: which is since put out to Interest for the Church's use as abovesaid. Which Legacy the Church gratefully acknowlegeth to have received, according to the religious and Generous gift, and bequest of the Testator; And so therefore desire our said Teacher to give to the said Executors full discharge for the same; if what is already given may not be thought sufficient.

Voted on the Affirmative Deo predicto, Nemine contradicente.

It was further Voted that the Bason above mentioned be left in the Custody, and Keeping of the Reverend Mr. Nicholas Noyes for the Church's use as Occasion may offer. And that the Twenty five pounds already put out on Interest; the Bond of which being left in the said Mr. Noyes hands and also when the principle may be payed in, that our said Teacher, with the

Deacons for the time being, be Impowered to put out the same again, unto a Sufficient person or persons as in their discretion, they shall think meet, The Interest thereof always to be Improved for the help of poor Members as Abovesaid. Voted in the Affirmative Deo predicto, Nemine Contradicente.

Moreover Whereas the Abovenamed Colonel Samuel Brown Esquire, and Captain Jonathan Brown, have Lately given to the Church, Two large pewter flagons, which were formerly lent to the Church by the Uncle the aforenamed Benjamin Brown Esquire, wherefore the Church requests the Teacher to give Thanks and Suitable Acknowlegments to them for the same —

Unanimously Voted at the same Meeting.

March 9th Susanna wife of Thomas Laskin, and Mary Lander, and Hanna Lander, and Isabel Laurence, Mr. Epes his Negro woman, having bene examined and propounded, and nothing objected against either of them, they entered into covenant with God, and the church and were all of them Baptized.

23 Rebecka wife of Alexander Mackmalion and Sarah Grover having bene examined and propounded owned the Covenant with God and the church.

April 6 Elizabeth of Jonathan Felt and Elizabeth daughter of Richard King having bene examined and propounded Entered into Covenant with God and the Church and were Baptized.

The same day Nathaneel Ausgood and his wife Hanna, Dorithee wife of John Rogers Junior, Rebecka wife of Nathanael Massy and Elizabeth Beal having bene all examined and propounded renewed their covenant with God and the Church and were received to full communion with the consent of the Brethren.

13 Sarah Archer wife or widow of Stephen Archer and their daughter Sarah having bene both examined and propounded and nothing objected Entered into Covenant and were baptized.

Elizabeth Edwards Junior a child of the church having been guilty of attempting to murder herself by taking pounded glass about an spoonful and an half, it pleased God by means used to spare her life, though she was brought nigh to death, and lived in horrible pain and Horror of conscience, a considerable time: but being recovered pretty well sought reconciliation with the church and made a poenitent confession of her Sin and renewed her covenant with God and the church and the church forgave her, it was about a month since that she made this confession.

12 John Rogers having been propounded and nothing objected against his declaration and confession was read and he was received to full communion by entering into covenant with God and the church the brethren consenting.

19 Hanna Stacy daughter of Samuel Stacy was propounded in order to Baptizm.

26 Mary Lansford wife of Elias Lansford, formerly Mary Eagar, having bene Guilty of the sin of fornication, being with child by him who is now her husband, before she was married to him, and for that reason had bene put by the Sacrament, and ad-

monisht by the teacher of the church to repent and to bring forth fruit meet for repentance. She presented a very poenitent confession of her sin with the aggravation of it and made earnest supplication to God for forgiveness of her Sin and praying for reconciliation with the church, and promising through the grace of Christ to be more watchful against temptation to such like sins for the future, she was restored to the churches favor and communion again. The church also praying God to forgive her.

May 3 The brethren and Sisters living in the district presented their petition to the church for liberty to become a church of themselves they and their children which petition was read after Sacrament but no consent given to it at that time, but desired for some time of consideration; the copy of the petition is in the next page.

Honorable Reverend and beloved whereas it hath pleased our gracious God to smile upon our Endeavors for the erecting of an house for the carrying on the Publick worship of God, and settling a minister amongst us, and we being called by divine providence (as we apprehend) to settle a particular church according to the Gospel under the ministry of the Reverend Mr. Benjamin Prescott.

Our Humble request to yourselves is that you will please to dismiss us and our children with your approbation and Blessing to be a church of ourselves, and untill we are so, with the consent and approbation of the Elders and Messengers of the churches that shall assist at the ordination of the Reverend Mr. Prescott to continue members of Salem Church, and as there shall be occasion assist and help us, especially by your prayers unto the God of all grace, that in so great an affair we may be directed and assisted

to procede in all things according to the will of God,
into whom be glory in the church by Jesus Christ,
through out all ages world without End.

On May 19th notice was given for a church meeting at the Teachers house on May 22 at 4 in the afternoon to consider of the petition of our brethren and sisters living in the district and give answer to it when and where the church met and agitated that matter, but nothing was agreed upon that meeting but that the Answer to the petition should be further defered and considered of about a month long and that at the meeting then to be. The vacansy in the Deacons office by reason of the death of Mr. Gerrish¹ one of our Deacons should be considerd how it might be supplied.

¹Deacon Benjamin Gerrish had died April 24, 1713, at the age of sixty-one. He was a merchant, clerk of the court and collector of the port.

- May 24 Abel Robinson propounded in order to Baptizm.
- May 31 Elizabeth wife of Mathew Barton and Ruth, relict of William Loader were propounded in order to full communion and Lydia Cook propounded in order to Baptizm.
- June 7th. Elizabeth wife of Mathew Barton and Ruth relict of William Loader having bene examined and propounded and nothing objected against either of them, they both renewed their covenant with God and the church and were both received to full communion, with the consent of the brethren.
- 14 Abel Robinson and Lydia Cook having both bene examined and propounded and nothing objected against them they entered into covenant and were both baptized, and Abel Robinson had his child baptized the same day.
- 21 Notice was given for a church meeting at the Teachers house on June 25th at 4 in the afternoon to give answer to the petition of our brethren and sisters in the district, and to nominate one in order to fill up the vacancy in the Deacons office.
- 25 The brethren of the church met at the Teachers house, for the ends above said, and then and there the church agreed that the following Answer should be given to the petition of our brethren and sisters in the District, which petition is before recorded.
- The church having received a petition from our brethren and sisters living in the district wherein they desire a dismissal from us for themselves and their children in order to be a church of themselves. The church giveth in Answer as followeth, That although we can not praise or justify our brethrens proceeding so and so far as they have done in order to be a church of themselves without advising with or using means to obtain the consent of the church they belonged to; yet at the request of our Brethren and Sisters and for peace sake, we permit them and their children to become a church of themselves provided they have the approbation and consent of the Elders and Messengers of some other churches in communion with

us that shall assist at their church Gathering, and ordaining them a pastor. And untill they have so done, they continue members of this church. And so we commit them to the grace of God in Christ Jesus, praying that they may have divine direction and Assistance in the great work they are upon, and that they may become an Holy and orderly and peaceable church, and that the Lord would adde to them of such as are within their own limits many such as shall be saved.

The abovesaid Answer was twice, distinctly read to the Brethren of the church before it was voted, and then consented to by the vote of the church *nemine contradicente*.¹

At the same meeting Captain Simon Willard was Nominated, to supply the vacancy in the Deacons office, and to secur therein by way probation for some time, provided he qualify himselfe for it, by becoming a member of this church, he having hitherto only had communion with us, by virtue of letters of commendation from the church of Christ in Ipswich.²

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June 28

Mr. James Simons, Mr. Joseph Orn, Hebsibah wife of Samuel Leech, and Abel Robbinson, and his wife Elizabeth were propounded in order to full communion with the church.

July 5th

tion, and bene propounded and nothing objected against either of them, were as children of this church, and Baptized in it upon their renewing their covenant with God, and the church received to full communion, with the consent of the brethren. The same day also before sacrament Captain Simon Willard and his wife, having hitherto partaken with this church only by virtue of letters of Recommendation from the church at Ipswich now became members of this church by Entering into Covenant with God and this church.

The same day Captain Willard having signified his consent to serve as a Deacon in a way of probation, becoming a member of this church in order to comply with the desire of the church to serve in the Deacons office by way of probation. He entered upon it and served at the Lords Table.

Mehitabel Felton after examination and propounding entered into Covenant with God and the church and was baptized, and her child.
The same day Abigail Walk after examination renewed her covenant with God and the church.
- 28 Mrs. Sarah Boudich personally owned the Covenant.

- March 7 Mrs. Elizabeth Higginson after examination and propounding and nothing objected renewed her covenant personally with God and the church and was received to full communion with the church, the

Brethren consenting. After the Sacrament the church chose and desired Colonel John Higginson, Mr. Daniel Epes and Deacon Willard to go along with the Teacher of the Church to wait upon the Reverend Mr. George Corwin and to signify to him that the Church did choose and call him to the office of the ministry in this church desiring that he might be ordained a pastor of this church as soon as might be with conveniency in the Spring of the year, and to present him with the church votes relating to that matter and pray his Acceptance which they accordingly did the day following. The parish also having before this Time given their concurrence with the votes of the church and also voted what encouragement they would give him for his support in the work of the ministry here, and toward his ordination and desired William Hurst Esquire and Josiah Wolcot Esquire and Captain Walter Price Mr. John Higginson Junior and Captain William Pickerin to wait upon the Reverend Mr. George Corwin to signify to him their concurrence with the church in choosing and calling him to the offer of the ministry and to present him with the votes of the Parish relating to that matter and to pray his acceptance and to joyn with those that should be chosen by the church to present him with the church call and choice of him as above. The church did accordingly desire the before named Gentleman to go with those chosen by the parish and wait upon the Reverend Mr. Corwin to this end and accordingly they did and prayed his acceptance and the []¹ both of the churches choice and call and also of the parishes concurrence and promise a speedy answer.

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At a meeting of the Church of Christ at Salem in the first parrish there, held at the teachers house on January 22th 1713/14 the Deacons having given timely notice to the Bretheren of the church of the Said meeting appointed by the Teacher in Order to

Consider and agree and determine what the Church would do relating to the Choosing calling setting and ordaining the Reverend Mr. George Corwin to the worke of the ministry here.

1. the Church did then and there by the voate of lifting up the hand signifie that they did consent agre and determine as followeth viz. that forasmuch as they had had Severall years Experience of the Grace and Giffts and Ministeriale qualifications of the Reverend Mr. George Corwin as well as his Orthodoxy in Doctrine and unblameable conversation, they did choose and call him to the office of the ministry in this Church, desiring that he might be ordained a pastor of this Church, as Sone as might be with conveniency in the Spring of the yeare ensuing provided that they had the concurance of the inhabitants of the parrish with them and that the church and said inhabitants did Setle upon him such a mainetenance as would be Sutable and Sufficient and Should be to his good Satisfaction.
2. the Church did desire the teacher to signifie to the Selectmen the above said voate and to desire of them that they would apoint a parrish metting of the inhabitants of this parrish qualified for voating according to law whether of the Church or of the parrish to desire that they would give their Concurance with the said voat and that they would promote his ordination and settle a sutable Sallery for the Said Reverend Mr. George Corwine, and that they would choose some of the parish to joyne with those that shall be chosen by the Church to make Sutable aplication to said Mr. Corwine for his consent to the Call both of the Church and parrish.

The above written 2 votes were written, and distinctly read, 3 times once, and time given for the considering of the contents of them, and liberty given to every one of the church to object, if they saw cause, and none objecting. The two votes above-said, were put to vote severally, and both were un-animously agreed to, and determined by the lifting

up of the hand, Nemine contradicente, and when the negative was voted not one man lifted up his hand, as witnesseth Nicholas Noyes, Teacher of the Church.

Voated: That the Inhabitants of this parish do grant unto the said Mr. George Corwin for his Encouragement and maintenance a Salary of Ninety pounds Per Anno in passable Mony, or Bills of Credit of this Province, if he accepts of Ordination, and being Settled as a Minister of the Gospel in this parish — Which Sum of Ninety pounds shall be raised on the Inhabitants, by a rate or Tax, equally laid, and porportioned by the Assessors, annually chosen and appointed by the Parish for making the Ministers rates etc. The same to be paid in Annually to the Town Treasurer for the time being; Or to such person or persons as the Assessors aforesaid shall appoint annually to receive the same; And He or They to pay it in to the said Mr. George Curwin — But if the said Mr. George Curwin desires that the present Voluntary Weekly

Contribution may be continued for one year, or Longer time, and will accept of what shall be so given in full satisfaction for his Salary during the time the Contribution is continued; then the parish doth Consent and Agree to it. And if the Contribution shall fall short of the Yearly Salary granted by the parish as aforesaid; Or any unforeseen Inconveniency occur thereby; Upon timely notice thereof given to the Assessors of the Parish by Some Officer of the Church, that then the aforesaid Contribution shall cease, and the aforesaid Tax granted by the Parish shall be made by the said Assessors for the Years following or the time to come.

Voated: That William Hirst and Josiah Wolcott Esquires Mr. John Higginson Junior, Captain William Pickering and Walter Price are Chosen and desired to go to the Reverend Mr. George Curwin, in Conjunction with those the Church shall chose to acquaint him with the Voates of the said Parish, and to know whether He will accept of the same.

Voated: That if the Reverend Mr. George Curwin do accept of the aforesaid Call of the Church and Parish in order to Settlement, That then the Church are desired to chose some suitable person or persons to

[132] Provide all things Necessary for carrying on his Ordination when the same shall be brought forward; and they lay the charge of the same before the Assessors aforesaid in order to their raising the same on the Inhabitants of this parish at the time of making the Ministers Rates etc. All which were Unanimously voated; This is a true Copy of the Parish Voates in this Affair, as they are Recorded on the Parish Book.

After Sacrament, the Reverend Mr. George Corwins Answer to the church in calling of him to the office of a pastor in this church, wherein he signified his consent to their call and at the same time a meeting of the Brethren of the church at the Teachers house was appointed to be on Tuesday following at 3 of the clock in the afternoon.

- 6 At the church meeting at the Teachers house, the church appointed that the ordination of the Reverend Mr. George Corwin should be on Wednesday the 12th of May next ensuing, and signified their desire that provision should be made at the houses of the Reverend Mr. George Corwin and of Partman,¹ for

the entertaining of the elders and messengers of the churches that should be sent to and such others as is usual in such cases. At the same meeting the church determined to send letters to the North Church in Boston, and to the church in Boston of which the Reverend Mr. Colman is Pastor¹ and to the church in the Body of the Town of Ipswich and to the church in Beverly and to the church in Wenham and to the church in Marblehead, and to the church in Salem Village, to desire the presence and Assistance of their Elders and that those churches would please to send messengers with their Elders that things may be carried on in the ordination of the Reverend Mr. Corwins regularly, and with the consent of the Churches. At the same meeting the church chose and desired Deacon Willard, Mr. Francis Willougbe and Captain Ausgood, and Josia Wolcot Esquire and Mr. John Higginson Junior were desired and chosen by the church to joyn with the other three that the 5 together or the major part of them would make provision for Entertaining the elders and messengers of the churches and such others as is usual in such cases, at the above mentiond houses, leaving it to their prudence to make a suitable and comely preparation for the end aforesaid and to desire of Colonel Samuel Brown to supply them with mony on the credit of the Church and parish to defray the charges of the abovesaid preparation, he having promised the church that he would supply them with mony for that occasion.

11 Mr. Benjamin Gerrish, Mary wife of Philip English Junior, and Mary Felt after examination personally owned the covenant they were entered into in infancy and renewed it with God and the church.

25 Sarah wife of William Ropes was propounded in order to full communion the same day Robert Stone personally owned the Covenant and had his child baptized.

May 2 Sarah Ropes wife of William Ropes before the Sacrament renewed her Covenant with God and the

Church and was received to full communion with the consent of the Brethren. After Sacrament the necessity of altering the day appointed for the Ordination of the Reverend Mr. George Corwin was considered, the 13 of May being appointed by the Governor and Council to be a day of Publick fasting and prayer and the ordination of the Reverend Mr. George Corwin was appointed to be on the 19th day of May. It was also desired by the teacher that in that day appointed for fasting and prayer humble and fervant prayer, might be made to God for his blessing on his church and people here, and that God would be pleased to bless and prosper us in the intended ordination and that God would in great mercy to his church and people here make the Reverend Mr. George Corwin a successful instrument of his Glory and of the best good of his church and people here in converting many sinners to God and in his edifying and comforting his saints and people in the most holy faith, there had bene a day on purpose set apart for it, had not there bene so many publick days necessary in that month, wherein the people are so busie because of the seed time.

At the same the church desired their teacher to procede in the management of the affairs of the ordination on the day appointed and to give the Charge to the Reverend Mr. George Corwin at his Ordination.

May 19 The Reverend Mr. George Corwin was ordained a Pastor of this church. The Teacher gave him the charge, Dr. Cotton Mather gave him the Right hand of Fellowship. The Elders and messengers of the North Church in Boston, and of the Church in Brattle Street in Boston and of the First Church in Ipswich and of the Church in Beverly and of the Church of Marblehead, and of the Church at Wenham and of the Church at Salem Village, most, if not all of the Elders layed on hands. Dr. Mather began with prayer Mr. Corwin preacht on 2 Corinthians 2.16 the last clause of the text. Mr. Gerrish made the concluding prayer, Mr. Corwin pronounced
30 the blessing.

- John Ropes Senior Mrs. Elizabeth Epes and Mary Ropes were propounded in order to full communion with the church.

Died the Reverend Mr. George Curwin, In the 35th year of his Age, and the fourth year of his Ordained Ministry in this Church.

He was highly Esteemed in his Life, and very deservedly Lamented att his Death; having been very Eminent for his early improvements in Learning and Piety, his Singular Abilitys, and great Labours; his remarkable Zeal and Faithfulness in the Service of his Master. A Great Benefactor to our Poor. The Reverend Mr. Noyes his Life, was much bound up in him.

Died the Very Reverend and Famous Mr. Nicholas Noyes, Near 70 Years of Age, and in the 35th Year of his Ordained Ministry in this Church.

He was extraordinarily Accomplished for the Work of the Ministry, whereunto he was called; and wherein he found mercy to be Faithfull; and was made a rich, Extensive, and long continued Blessing.

Considering his Superiour Genius, his Pregnant Witt, Strong Memory, Solid Judgement, his Great Acquisition in humane Learning and knowledge, his Conversation among men, especially with his Friends, so very Pleasant, Entertaining, and Profitable; his Uncommon Attainments in the Study of Divinity;

his Eminent Sanctity, Gravity and Virtue, his Serious, Learned, and Pious Performances in the Pulpit, his more than Ordinary Skill in the Propheticall Parts of Scripture, his Wisdom and Usefulness in humane Affairs, and his Constant Sollicitude for the Publick Good.

It is no Wonder, that Salem and the Adjacent Parts of the Country, as also the Churches, University and People of New England, Justly Esteem him as a Principal Part of their Glory.

He was Born att Newbury, 22d December 1647.
And died a Bachelour.

Those Characters were Drawn by Persons well Acquainted with these Reverend Persons Deceased and who did them but Justice, and were Published in the Publick News Letters in Boston.

Voted: Nemine Contradicente, That the Church do make choyce of Mister Samuel Fisk¹ to be their Minister for this Church and Parish.

Voted: That Daniel Epes and Stephen Sewall Esquire and Captain Peter Osgood are appointed a Committee to wait upon Mr. Samuel Fisk and acquaint him with the choyce of the Church and to desire him to continue preaching to us, and this congregation, till the Parish Meeting be called and over.

Voted: That Daniel Epes, Stephen Sewall Esquire and Captain Peter Osgood are appointed a Committee to attend the Parish Committee and acquaint them with the Churches choyce of Mr. Samuel Fisk for their Minister and desire the said Committee to call a Parish Meeting in order to give their concurrence with the Churches choyce of Mr. Samuel Fisk as soon as may be with conveniency.

The Reverend Elders and Messengers of the Churches, which were Invited, Assembled in Council, att Salem — in pursuance of their Invitation — And The Reverend Mr. Thomas Blowers Opened the Publick Service by Prayer. The Reverend Mr. Benjamin Colman Preached on 2. Corinthians 4. 5. an Excellent Sermon to the vast Assembly — After Sermon Mr. Fisk prayed: Then the Reverend Mr. Gerrish Prayed and Gave the Charge, the Reverends Mr. John Rogers and Mr. Benjamin Colman and Mr. Thomas Blowers Imposing hands with him: Next — The Reverend Mr. John Rogers Gave the

right-hand of Fellowship to the Ordained Pastor in the name of the Reverend Elders present: After which, the fourth part of the Hundred and Eighteenth Psalm was sung and the Pastor Pronounced the Blessing: 2 Corinthians 2 Chapter 16th Verse and 12 chapter 9th Verse.

On this Ordination Day, the Assembly Mett att the New Church, which was now almost perfectly finished: A Vast and Beautifull, yet Grave House it is. It was began to be raised on May 21st 1718, and it was completely raised, May 24th 1718. The Congregation first Mett to Worship God in it on July 13th 1718. No Hurt was Sustained either in Pulling down the old-house, or Raising the New one. Laus Deo Salvatori!

This is the Third House Erected for the Publick Worship of God, on the Same Spot of Land, on which the first Church was Built in this Town and which was the first in the Province.¹

Oct. 25th George Dean was Propounded to the Church in Order to Baptism.

Having been Examined, and professed repentance of the Sin of fornication, which he had committed, and nothing being Objected against him, Entered into Covenant with God, in the church, and was Baptised. Hannah, the Wife of George Dean, having been guilty of the Sin of Fornication, with him the said George Dean; and having signified to the Pastor on her Death Bed her repentance of that Sin and her desire to be reconciled to the Church, of which she was a child; It was proposed now by the Pastor to the church to think charitably of her, who had manifested repentance, and would have reconciled herself to the church, had not Mr. Noyes and Mr. Curwin Died so suddenly, or if she had lived to the opportun-

ity her husband hath had; Accordingly the Church voted to receive her to their Charity.¹

Nov. 23 The Pastor, after the Publick Worship was Concluded, Acquainted the Brethren of the Church, that he had received a Paper Subscribed by Severall of the Brethren and Sisters of this Church, living in the Eastern part of this Place, (now by this Parish made a Distinct Precinct) wherein their request to be Dismissed and recommended from this Church; which Paper was now read by the Pastor; and is as followeth:

Salem, November 14th, 1718.

The Request of the Brethren belonging to the East Meeting House to be dismissed and recommended in order to their being Constituted a Distinct Church.

To the Reverend Mr. Samuel Fisk, Pastor of the first Church in Salem, And to the Church —

Honored Reverend and Beloved:

Whereas, all of Us the Subscribers have been for some time, Under Covenant Obligations to this Church, and whereas now Divine Providence opens a way for our Embodying into a Church State ourselves, under the Pastoral Care of the Reverend Mr. Robert Stanton,² whom we design, to have ordained for that Purpose, as soon as conveniently may be.

And although some few of Us have failed in our Duty, in our former proceedings, We pray it may be Overlooked and Passed by.

And we humbly and heartily request of you, that you would be pleased so to release us from our Covenant Obligations, as that we with our Children may have your free Consent to Embody, into a Church by Ourselves, and may be by you recommended to the Pastoral Care of our Intended Pastor, Mr. Stanton.

Altho' we cannot but bear due Testimony against the Irregular Proceedings of some of the said Brethren, in their managements of that Affair of building a house for a Separate Assembly, contrary to the Usage and Proceedings of other Brethren formerly belonging to this Church in the Gathering of a Church; and Contrary to Good Order. Yet for Peace Sake, considering that those of our said Brethren who requested dismissal, and who have been Guilty, have confessed their faults, and desired that it might be Overlooked. And We being Ready to Encourage the Work of the Gospell among Us in this Town Do Dismiss our said Brethren and Sisters with their children who Dwell to the eastward of the said line, from this Church (so as that they attend Communion and Church Order with Us, till their Pastor is Ordained) and recomend them, to the care of the Reverend Mr. Robert Stanton, whom they intend to have ordained their Pastor.

Voted: That the Brethren of this Church will privately speedily consider of Some proper Method to Revive a Lecture in this place, and when they are prepared a Number of them shall repair to the Pastor and pray him to Cale a Church Meeting farther to prosecute the vote passed in the last Church Meeting, concerning the Lecture.¹

a Letter he had Received from the Church of Christ in Wenham, which Invited the presence and Assistance, of the Pastor and delegates of this Church, in Council with other Churches to Judge, of the Processe of that Church with an Offender — William Rogers — who is suspended by the said Church and is not reconciled to the Church. After reading the said Letter —

The Pastor putt it to vote, whether they would proceed upon the said Letter, and choose and send Delegates — it was voted unanimously in the Affirmative. Then — It was putt to vote, whether they would Desire and choose their Brethren Deacon Osgood, Colonel Samuel Brown, Mr. Daniel Epps, to represent them in the said Council and Accompany the Pastor which was voted in the Affirmative — Accordingly —

July 29th

A Councill att Wenham

The Pastor and Delegates of this Church, Mett att Wenham and Joyned in Councill with the Pastors and Messengers of the First Church in Boston, and the Fourth Church in Boston, and the First Church in Beverly; after prayer, the Councill formed themselves and Chose the Reverend Mr. Benjamin Wadsworth Moderator And the Pastor of this Church Clerk, and after some time sent to Mr. William Rogers to Appear before the Councill att the Meeting House — He sent word that before he sent an Answer he would take advice, viz. of the Pastors and Delegates which, it seems Mr. Wise had called this Day, to a private house, to second his admonition to the Church of Wenham, for male-administration in suspending Mr. William Rogers; Upon receiving this word The Councill went to the Meeting house and after the Moderator had prayed he Declared to the Assembly the cause and occasion of their present meeting in Councill, and then Desired the Reverend Mr. Gerrish to bring forward his cause, which he did; offering and reading the Charge against the Said William Rogers and the evidences to Prove it: and after hearing the objections offered by

three Brethren of the Church against the Evidence, and their Evasion on the behalf of the said William Rogers, and the Reply of the Pastor, and the Cloud of Witnesses in the Church, to testify and Assert what the Pastor replied; The Councill Adjourned from the Publick, Considered the case in Private — and in their Result, Justified the whole Processe of the Church in Wenham — and their neglect and Disregard of the Second Church in Ipswich in what they had done to Acquit Mr. Rogers and Advised Solemnly and in the name of God the said Rogers to humble himself before God, to Fly to the blood of Christ, and reconcile himself to the Church; This result was Read in the Meeting house in the Audience of the Assembly (which was now very large) by the foresaid Clerk of the Councill, then Mr. Colman Prayed and Gave the Blessing — And the Councill was Dissolved, after It had ordered Mr. Rogers (though he appeared not att the Councill, nor sent them any Answer) should have a Copy of this result.¹

¹The Wenham Church suspended William Rogers on January 31, 1716/7, whereupon he appealed to the Second Church in Ipswich, which, in turn, on July 16, 1719, convened an Ecclesiastical Council to redress the wrong. The issues are not clear but the Ipswich Church was convinced that “the said Church seems to us either obstinately bent upon a design to subvert the ancient Constitution of these Churches, or through the prevalency of some temptation are rushing upon their own Confusion.” The Council declared that “Mr. Rogers has not given any just offence to the said Church in Wenham” but further counseled him “that he suppress all hard resentments toward his Pastor and brethren notwithstanding the unkindness and injustice he has met from them.” A copy of the minutes of the Council was given to the wife of Mr. Gerrish, the pastor, since he refused to accept them or communicate the recommendations to the church. Mr. Gerrish died in January 1719/20 at the age of seventy. “The Church found their position a bar to obtaining a pastor, and, at last, voted to restore Rogers and revoke their action in his case.” Dexter MSS., “Ecclesiastical Councils, No. 89.”

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Oct. 18th The Pastor after Exercise Stayed the Church, and Signified to the Brethren the Desire of Susannah the Wife of Mr. John Howe (who Dwelleth now in Marlborough) to be recommended to the Church there, which was Accordingly Consented to.

Oct. 29th A Generall Thanksgiving was Ordered by the Government, and Observed here accordingly — The Pastor Preached — £7:6:0 was by contribution Collected for the Poor.

Jan. 24th The Pastor, after Evening Worship was concluded Stayed the Brethren of the Church and Communicated to them the desire of Sarah the Wife of Miles Ward to be recommended to the Eastern Church in this town; and it being considered by the Church, that her Husband, had purchased a Seat in the Eastern Church Meeting House, and was taken into the Eastern Precinct by the line Sett by the Generall Court, it was voted that she should be recommended according to her desire.

A Letter from the New North Church in Boston to this Church, concerning the Instalm. of the Reverend Mr. Peter Thatcher

Now also was Communicated a Letter sent from the New North Church in Boston to this church which Invited the presence and Assistance of the Pastor and messengers of this Church In the Installment of the Reverend Mr. Peter Thatcher lately Pastor of Weymouth in the Pastorall Office in the said New North Church; as also a Brief Representation of the Grievances of some of the Brethren, of the said N. N. Church, and some of the Congregation was communiated to this Church, that so the state of the said N. N. Church, might be well Understood by our Brethren which papers being read. It was voted that this church would send their Messengers to Meet the Pastors and Messengers of five other churches, on the 27 of this Instant January, to Consider, whether it might be proper to Countenance, and Concurr with the said N. N. Church in their Intended Proceeding on said Day. It was voted also, that our Brethren Colonel Samuel Brown, Judge Lynde, Mr. Epes, Mr. Timothy Lindall, and Deacon Osgood, are desired and Empowered to represent this Church on Said Day and Joyn with the abovesaid Churches, if they think it Convenient.

These votes passed Nemine Contradicente.

Accordingly on —

Jan. 27 The Pastor and two Messengers of this Church Mett att Boston, and finding that there were att most but two Churches which were sent to by the said New North Church convened: It was Judged by the said Pastor and Messengers to be most Agreeable to the above votes that this church should not Act on this Occasion — the Majority of our Messengers from the Church and the Majority of the Churches Invited, not appearing. Accordingly, the Pastor and Messengers abovesaid Informed the Churches Convened that they Could not Enter into Council and then Informed the Pastor and Brethren of the New North Church thereof, and also Exhorted the Dissenting Brethren of the New North Church and Congregation to putt on a Spirit of Meekness, humility, and Condesention and to Act as becometh Men, and to have their Speech and behaviour as becometh holinese, Laying aside all Anger, wrath, malice, guile and evill Speaking as becometh Saints.¹

March 31 A generall Fast was Observed. The Pastor Preached. Now £5.2.10 was Collected by Contribution.

A Confession:

Now Anne Wife of Nathaniel Woodbridge Confessed, the Sin of Fornication, which she had heretofore committed but not with her present Husband. Now the Pastor proposed a Case to the Church which was Stayed after Evening Worship, for that End. Vizt: Whether they could se reason to think well of

¹The calling of Mr. Thatcher to the New North Church was the occasion of great controversy. He had been settled at Weymouth in 1707 and his removal to a more affluent parish in Boston was viewed as self-seeking on his part and unethical on the part of the Boston Church. The church itself was divided on the matter and the minority withdrew to form the New Brick or "Revenge" Church. Thatcher gradually won his way into the esteem of his contemporaries and served the Boston Church until his death on February 26, 1738/9. Cf. Sibley, IV, 308.

Sept. 11 the Administration of Baptism to Mary Cook of this Parish who had such a Wasting Consumption as that She was not Able, Either to Go or be carryed into Gods House, and was earnestly Desiring to Enter into Covenant and be Baptized — the Pastor proposed for the facilitating this Affair. That a
 [147] Number of the Brethren Deputed by the Church should be present to represent the Church in Admitting her to Church Estate, and to be Witnesses of her Baptism — also the Pastor preached a sermon leading to and clearing up such an Administration. This Case it was Pleaded was new, and some of the Brethren desired to Consider of it, till the next Lords Day, accordingly it was referred to that proposed time, now also the Pastor propounded her Desire then to Covenant and be Baptised.

Sept. 18 The Pastor, according to the Above Method proposed the Case, Severall of the Brethren Declared themselves Satisfyed, so as that they could see their way clear to Proceed — the Pastor Instanced in a Person who about seven years since, in our Brother Keysar's Dwelling house, renewed her Baptismal Covenant by the Ministry of the Reverend Mr. Noyes, and Mr. Corwin who was Present with him and many other of the Church whom Mr. Noyes called in Occasionally for that Affair — the Person was Sarah Gilloway who was very ill, and was about being carryed out of Town to seek relief and healing if it might be had; hence the Pastor Argued that there was an Instance much more doubtfull than the case he proposed, for Mr. Noyes never asked the sense of the Church nor so much as propounded her Desires to renew her Covenant, nor were there any Members appointed by the Church to represent them in that matter, and yet this Church never showed any Dissatisfaction in this Management.

Severall Persons were Moving to proceed to vote in the case proposed. Accordingly the Pastor putt it to vote in the Affirmative vizt: whether they could think well and approve of such an Administration and carryed — Generally if not Unanimously.

Then the Pastor desired the Church to Nominate certain Persons of their Body to represent them in this Affair, which some of the Brethren complied with and Mentioned severall, who were putt to vote and it was voted Unanimously, these should represent the Church.

Then the Pastor, and one of the Deacons vizt. Peter Osgood, with the Appointed Brethren, Went to the Dwelling house of the said Mary Cook, Informed her of their design, and the Pastor attended the Usual form of Admission and in propounding the Covenant to her in the Article of repentance inserted a clause of Confession and penitence, in regard of her having so long and while in a state of health neglected taking upon her the Baptismall Engagements to which with the rest of the Covenant She Answered audibly, Yea, tho' nigh to Death, and much Unable to Speak; Upon which she was received into Christ's fold, and was Baptised.

Leading to this was Prayer: She Expressed her great thanks for what God had thus Done for her soul. A considerable Number of the Church and of the Congregation were Present att the Administration.

Voted: That this Church would send their Messengers with their Pastor, on this Occasion — accordingly

Voted: That our Brethren Deacon Peter Osgood, and Mr. Daniel Epes and Major Stephen Sewall; do company with the Pastor, and represent this Church as in said Letter, from said Church in Lynn, it is Desired.

- Oct. 27 A Publick Thanksgiving was observed by Order of the Government. Now was Collected up a Contribution for the Poor. £13:2:10.
- Nov. 2 This is the Day Sett apart for the Ordination of the Reverend Mr. Nathaniel Henchman as Pastor of the Church of Christ in Lynn, but the Pastor being very Ill and the Weather Exceedingly Stormy he could not go nor did any of the Appointed Brethren go — the Weather being so very Stormy and they Aged Persons mostly. Neverthelesse the First Church in Reading and the two Presbyterian Churches in Marblehead were Present att Lynn, and separated the Said Reverend Person to the Pastorall Office, on said Day.
- Lynn Ordination by Reading Church and the two Churches in Marblehead:
- The First Church in Beverly and the Church in the Middle Precinct in Salem, were prevented going to Lynn, by the Storm, as well as this Church, so there were Just half the Churches sent to, present and Assisting.

- April 20 A Generall Fast was Observed by Order of the Government. Now was Collected by a Contribution for the Poor. £7:7:0.
- April 23 The Pastor, after Divine service was performed, Stayed the Brethren of the Church, and proposed to them the desire of our Sister Mary Waters, the wife of Ezekiel Waters (who dwelleth in the Eastern Parish in this Towne) to be recommended to the Communion of the Eastern Church in this Towne; and be Dismissed from this Church to that, which was by the usual sign of Silence, consented to by the Brethren.

- July 2 Now Susannah Prettice confessed her Error and rashness in partaking of the Elements of the Lords Supper last Communion Day, before she was admitted thereto — she had been propounded and

nothing was Objected Against her — and she thought the Pastor forgot to call her forth before Sacrament to Admitt her and so she thought she had better Communicate then not, though she Omitted her Duty, in not coming down to the Pastor, on the Saturday before, as she was by him ordered to do, which she forgott, and so she was not Admitted by him.

The Church Accepted her Acknowledgment, and received her to their Communion, as she had before this Entered into Covenant and was Baptized in the Church of Christ in the Village in this Town, and so had a Manifest right to our Communion.

fruitts of the Earth, and the treasures of the Sea (the fish) have been greatly Wasted and Indamaged that God will be graciously pleased, to give us fair weather, after the rain, to preserve the remains of the blessings of Goodnesse. And prayers were offered to God on these Accounts, also for the Land, for Great Brittain and the Church of God. Mr. Clark and Mr. Stanton Preached and Mr. Prescott and the Pastor prayed.

There was a very Great Assembly, the foul weather, partly Occasioning and causing it. We had no Contribution (as it is our Custom on such days to have) because we had part of Severall Assemblys in the Town and so could not tell how to distribute it, had we Collected it.

Dec 3d The Pastor and Delegates of this Church Mett att the Second Parish in Reading and Joyned in Council with the Pastors and Delegates of Six other Churches. The Churches before they formed themselves into Council (by Choosing a Moderator) Resolved, that Unlesse the Pastor and Church, and also the Aggrieved Brethren the second Church in Reading would first Resolve and bind themselves by verbal Promise — to be Determined by the Result of this Council — That the Severall Elders and Messengers convened on this Occasion, would Return to their Severall Places of Abode; this was Resolved Nemine Contradicente and Accordingly proposed to the Partys Concerned who Severally consented thereto. Then The Elders and Delegates present formed themselves mor compleatly into a Council, by Choosing with an Unanimous Vote The Reverend Mr. Thomas Cheevor Moderator. Upon which the Council went into the Church and after the Moderator had Prayed, he called upon the Aggrieved Brethren to Bring forth their Allegations against their Pastor which was done and they were Read by the Moderator Publickly throughout, and then the First Article was read and, the Accusers required to give in their Evidence and Proof, which they did, after which the Pastor as he was called to do Made his Defence of himself and the Church gave full Evidence of his Innocence; then two of the Aggrieved Brethren withdrew their hand from the Paper Given into their Pastor, which contained their allegations against him. And said they had Agreed with their Pastor which he Confirmed — so they were Dismissed. After their Dismission, the rest of the Articles were read and proceeded upon, as in the first till all were Discussed, On which the Council adjourned to Mr. Putnams and there the Council voted upon the severall Charges advanced and the defence and an-

swers made to them with []¹ Deliberation the Deacons and Delegates beginning first to Speak and offer their Judgment. There was a result Drawn out of these votes which with the votes were Unanimously voted and Passed in the Council. Then forms of []² were drawn for the Aggrieved Brethren to sign and offer to the Injured Pastor and Church and Those again being []³ by the Aggrieved and being Accepted by the Pastor and the Church — Their Differences were thus Adjusted and all Partys being Exhorted to Live in Love and Peace — The Council Determined to Go into the Publick []⁴ which they did and the Reverend Mr. Barnard of Marblehead, having been Chosen Clerk of the Council Read the Result and then the 133 Psalm was Sung, after which the Reverend Mr. Hancock prayed and then the Moderator publickly Dissolved the Council.⁵

Inadequate support led to tensions and on April 17, 1723, he appealed to the Bradford Association of Ministers for advice on "how to manage a Controversy between some of his church members." Laying the matter before the church proved fruitless and on December 3, 1723, an Ecclesiastical Council was convened which found the charges against him "groundless and unjust," although he "did use some sharpness, as to the extent of speech . . . which though he had great Provocation, yet had better have been let alone." Deacon Thomas Taylor and Captain Thomas Briant seem to have been the leaders of the opposition. The Council failed to restore peace but a second council two years later apparently restored harmony for Mr. Putnam continued to serve the church until his death on June 20, 1759. Cf. A paper Intituled a Resolve, was Read att a Meeting of this First Parish in Salem, as it was before read to the Church and Congregation, on the Lordsday July 15th 1725 by Deacon Peter Osgood, both which Publick Readings thereof, was expresly ordered by the Generall Court or Assembly of this Province.

The Resolve for the Memorableness of it is here Recorded — vizt.

Att a Great and Generall Court or Assembly for his Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England, begun and held att Boston, upon Wednesday, May 26th, 1725.

The Following Resolve passed both Houses, and was consented to by his Honour the Lieutenant Governour, vizt:

Upon Serious consideration of the great distresses that many of the Ministers of the Gospel within this Province, labour Under with respect to their Support or Maintenance, their Salary being generally paid in the Publick Bills of Creditt of this Province; altho' Many of the Ministers Contracted with their People, in the time when Silver Money passed in

Payment; and the Necessarys of Life, such as cloathing, provisions, together with Labour and other things, now demand so much more of the Bills of Creditt, than heretofore.

Resolved. That it is the Indispensable duty of the Severall Towns, Precincts, and Parishes of this Province to make such Additions to the Salaries or Maintenance of their Respective Ministers, as may honourably Support and Encourage them in their work, and therein to have regard, as well to the time of the contract between the Minister and People, and the specie therein Mentioned; as to the great and growing difference in the value of the Bills of Creditt, from what they have sometimes been. And This Court do therefore most earnestly recommend, the Speedy and cheerfull practice of this duty, to the Severall Congregations, and Religious Assemblys, within this Province; and that This Resolve be publickly Read, on the Next Lordsday, after the receipt hereof in the Afternoon, before the Congregation be Dismissed. And att the Anniversary Meeting of the Several Towns, or Precincts, in the Province, in the Month of March next. —

The Lord made them both very Great Blessings. A Publick Meeting was held in the Afternoon of this Day, (being Saturday) in the House of God, partly on Account of the Sudden and we fear Unnaturall Death of our Sister Hannah Moses a Member of this Church for Many years past also partly on Account of a terrible Earthquake which was on Lordsday night last — at half an hour after Ten; Both Parishes Mett on this occasion and

Now there was collected by a Contribution for the Poor, Thirty one Pounds, Seven Shilings, of which Fourty Shilings — was particularly directed to one Single Person.

- Dec. 21 A Publick Fast, was Appointed by the Civil Government on Account of the late Surprising and Dreadfull Earthquake, which happened on the night between the 29th and 30th Days of October last past, about half an hour after ten-clock, and which lasted, that is the first shock, about 6 Minutes, att least in this Town, and which was followed by many others during that night — and afterwards; Especially in the Northern Parts of this Province till this time. This Extended as we have been informed as far as Pensilvania Southwards, and how far Northwards we cannot tell, only we are informed as far as any of our Northeast Settlements reach.¹ This Day was observed by us, and the Eastern Parish in this Town who Joyned with us. Now there was Collected by a Contribution for the Poor. Twenty one Pounds, Seven Shilings and Nine Pence.

of this Church, to Joyn with Those of other Churches in Council — there on May 15th inst. The Pastor informed the Brethren of this Church, himself could not go as he had told the Pastor of that Church — that the other Pastors in this neighbourhood had wrote to the said Pastor and Church, they could not attend them for Severall reasons and the other Party in said church had not Joyned in Calling this Council upon which, it was voted by this Church that they should not send any Messenger on this Occasion.

3. The Third and Last Letter was from the Reverend Mr. Daniel Greenleaf¹ Pastor of the West Church in Yarmouth, Inviting the Pastor and one Messenger of this Church to Joyn in Council with those of other Churches there on May 22d Inst. to Judge of Matters relating to himself and his Church and Parish — The Pastor informed the Brethren of this Church himself could not go; there was but one Party called this Council — the Pastors in this Neighbourhood had sent Mr. Greenleaf word they could not now come, and this is the Day of the Ordination below. Upon all which, It was voted by this Church — that they should not send any Messenger on this Occasion. These cases were Pityed but we could not help them att least now — Since not all Partys agreed to call in help. Then the Brethren of this Church were Dismissed.

The Church now desired to Speak their mind for or against it as they Inclined, but one Spake who was for it the rest now silent, when therefore I told I shuld, because it was our Custom, take as consenting — I suppose they were all for it, by what I had heard, for I had propounded this matter (not only to the neiboring Pastors, who much approved it, which I told this Church) but to the people in private conversation, so that they had some Expectation of this publick proposal.

Then the foresaid Mr. Brown was Chosen by the Council to give the Charge, all the Elders present to Assist in Laying on their hands; Next the Pastor of this Church was Chosen to Give the Right hand of Fellowship; Mr. Prescott of this Town preached. so far, as to Chuse and Send a Delegate on this Occasion; If It Did, It was Desired they would Signify their Minds, by Lifting Up their Right hands, but a few hands were Uplifted. Then the Pastor Acquainted the Church of the Reasonableness of their fully Declaring themselves, and also the Duty of fellowship of Churches and observed the Difficultys, which possibly might arise from a refusal to Afford Assistance and finding no one person Spoke either for or Against, Complying with the Letter, he putt it in the negative, when a very few hands were lifted up.

The Veren tankard and the Hirst beaker have been lost; the large beaker given by Elizabeth Browne passed into the possession of the South Church; the metal in the silver basin given by William Browne Secundus was combined with two other pieces received in 1743 and 1763 into a silver dish by Churchill and Treadwell of Boston and is owned by The First Church; the baptismal basin given by Benjamin Browne was melted into two basins and distributed between the Tabernacle and the South Churches at the division of the Church stock in 1762. The First Church possessed 216 ounces of plate in 1735 which by agreement was divided with the Tabernacle Church by vote of the First Church, July 6, 1762.
